CHICAGO (AP) — Roberto de Vicenzo Monday won the \$25,000 All-American golf championship at Tam O'Shanter with a closing 70 for a 15-under-par 273. Gene Littler, closing with a record-matching 63, took second with 277.

The victory, Roberto's second in five tournaments starts this year, was worth \$3,500. It set up the 220-pound pro, who registers from Mexico City, among the favorites in the \$101,200 world championship starting at Tam O'Shanter Thursday.

## Duck Season Is Unchanged

Open seasons and daily bag limits for ducks, Wilson's Snipe and woodcock on Prince Edward Island remain the same this year as in 1956, the Canadian Wildlife Service of the Department of Northern Affairs and National Resources said today.

This applies throughout the Province of Prince Edward Island, and dates include opening and closing days. They are:

Ducks: other than Wood Ducks; and Geese (other than Brant): October 1 to November 9th.

Brant: October 29 to November 27th.

Wilson's Snipe and Woodcock: October 1 to November 2.

Waterfowl hunting restrictions are the same as last year except that the use of recorded waterfowl calls is prohibited, and that migratory game birds may now be shot from a power boat if the power boat is beached, or resting at anchor, or fastened within, or tied immediately alongside, of any type of fixed hunting blind.

## Dodgers Defeat N. Y. Giants; Indians Defeat N. Y. Yankees

NEW YORK (AP)—Mike Garcia beat New York Yankees for the first time in more than two years Monday as Cleveland broke the league-leaders' eight-game winning streak. The defeat cut the Yanks' margin over idle Chicago to six games.

Don Larsen, who never has downed the Indians in his major league career, was the victim of the Tribe's eight-hit attack which included a three-run homer by Gene Woodling in the eighth. The former Yankee drove in five runs with his 10th homer and a second-inning single.

Not since Aug. 2, 1955 had Garcia won over the Yanks and this was only his third complete game in 17 starts. The husky right-hander allowed nine hits, pitching out of trouble in the seventh when he struck out Mickey Mantle and retired Yogi Berra. The Yanks had loaded the bases with only one out.

Again in the ninth, he put down a threat after the Yanks put two on with nobody out. Berra filed out to end the game with the bases full.

Woodling put the game beyond reach in the ninth. With the Indians holding a 4-2 lead, Larry Raines and Bobby Avila singled.

Woodling followed with his home run into the upperfield stands.

BROOKLYN (AP)—Brooklyn Dodgers scored a tie-breaking, fifth-inning run without a hit and went on to defeat New York 5-2 Monday night despite a one-man show by Willie Mays, who had four hits and drove in both Giants runs with his 25th homer.

The Giant centerfielder was a bit of a goat, too, however—with his error giving the Brooks an unearned run and bounding out to end the game with two men on base.

The third-place Dodgers moved within 2 1/2 games of the National League lead and within two games of second place. It was the only game scheduled.

Righthander Ray Crone, who lost his fifth in a row for a 4-6 record, gave up his only walk to leadoff man Junior Gilliam in the payoff fifth inning. Junior stole second, went to third as Mays made a great run into left to grab Gino Cimoli's long fly, and then hustled home on Elmer Valo's high infield chopper.

The Brooks wrapped it up for good with two in the seventh as young Don Drysdale gained a 9-6 record with his third victory in a row.

# Marlene Stewart Streit Leads In Qualifying Rd.

MONTREAL (CP) — Marlene Stewart Streit, ready to defend her Canadian ladies' open amateur golf championship, led the qualifying round in a breeze Monday with a crackling four under par 73 and definitely stamped her self again as the one to beat when match play starts today.

Closest to her was Mrs. Maurice Glick of Baltimore, Md., with par 77, followed by two other American girls, Marjorie Burns of Greensboro, N.C., with 78, and Mrs. Charles F. Spalding of Greenwich, Conn., with 79.

There was a parade of Canadian girls from 81 to 90, the last qualifying figure which brought about a five-way sudden-death playoff.

Mona Morup of Calgary won the playoff spot at the third hole. Marlene fired her 73 with the same machine-like golf that gave her the Canadian Ladies' Close title Saturday for the seventh straight time. She has won the open title four times in the last six years.

Leading the Canadian girls eight strokes behind Marlene were Janet MacWha of nearby St. Lambert and Kay Helleur of Woodbridge, Ont., each with 81. Rae Milligan, Mary Gay of Calgary, Betty Stanhope of Edmonton, 19-year-old Judy Darling of Montreal and Roma Neundorf of Toronto had 82s.

Joyce Alston of Ottawa and Mrs. Douglas Sharpe of Fonthill, Ont., were alone at 83.

More than 100 started looking for a berth among the 32 qualifiers for the championship flight. There were many disappointments but few real casualties.

Marlene was paired with Mrs. Glick, who reached the semi-final at Dartmouth, N.S., in 1954. The Baltimore veteran is believed by many to be the most dangerous American in the field.

Marlene whipped along the front nine in 35, three under par, while Mrs. Glick took par 38.

Marlene was back in 38, one under, and Mrs. Glick was again par with her 39.

BIRDIED 4TH

Marlene birdied the fourth with a 25-foot putt, missed an eagle at the par five sixth when her second shot hit the pin and rolled off—but she got her birdie—and had another birdie at the ninth with an eight-foot putt after a beautiful wood shot.

She went par from the 10th to the 13th where she found a trap and went over par for the only time in her trip. She birdied the 16th, needing only a four-foot putt, and the long par-six 17th where she hit the green with her second shot and was down in two.

Mrs. Glick birdied the first, lost the stroke at the second and then went par to the seventh, a par four 390-yarder, where she had an easy birdie.

Coming home she was over again at the short 10th when she drove into a trap and went par again to the 17th, which was an other birdie. She took par five at the 18th.

Judy Darling, winner of the junior Canadian title last Saturday, took 39 going out but slipped off to 43 coming home. The other 19-year-old youngster she defeated in a playoff for the junior crown—Mary Ellen Driscoll of Saint John, N.B.—shot 42-42.

## May Bat .400 In 57

NEW YORK (AP)—With a .389 batting average and less than one-third of the season remaining, Ted Williams stands a good chance of finishing over .400 for the second time in his brilliant big league career.

But the 38-year-old Boston Red Sox outfielder will have to improve on his performance against Washington Senators.

The Red Sox are scheduled to play 12 of their remaining 31 games against the seventh-place Senators. In their first 10 meetings, Williams managed to collect only 10 hits in 34 times at bat for a .294 mark.

Against the rest of the league Williams is well over the .300 Cleveland; 442 Kansas City; 364 Chicago; 357 Detroit; 356 Baltimore and 343 against New York Yankees.

Williams who batted .406 in 1941 and captured the American League title four times, has hit safely in his last 13 games and 24 of his last 25.

In last week's games, Ted streaked at a .538 pace. He had 14 safeties in 26 tries and increased his average 13 points.

Mickey Mantle of the Yankees remained in second place. He climbed 16 points to 368 with 13 hits in 21 at bats.
