Souris Hospital Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of the Souris Hospital was held in the Town Hall on Thursday night, September 20th. The president, R. C. MacLean, presided and the secretary, M. J. MacQuaid, read the minutes of the last meeting and the financial statement, which were approved as read.

A nominating committee consisting of W. W. Haynes, W. S. McIntyre, Reid Underhay, and J. H. Brennan were appointed by the president to submit a list of names for directors for the coming year.

Considerable discussion took place regarding the construction of an annex to the Hospital and it was decided to leave this matter for another year.

Mrs. J. A. Paquet, president of the Ladies' Auxiliary, reported that they had raised the sum of \$1600.28 during the past year and had a cash balance of \$843.26 at the present time.

A discussion on the present rates of the Hospital then took place with the following speakers taking part: Mrs. Adrian McInnis, Rev. W. B. F. Corckum, Dr. A. A. MacDonald, Chester McCaugh, Geddie Coffin and Edwin Reid.

It was the general opinion that the rates should be increased with the amount of increase left to the Board to decide. The net debt of the Hospital at the present time is \$5,000.00. The debt has been reduced from \$15,000 since September 1945.

At a meeting of the directors the following were appointed trustees: R. C. MacLean, M. J. McQuaid, B. L. Stewart, Clifford Peters, G. B. Leard.

The financial statement showed an excess of expenditure over receipts of \$396.84, and a current balance in the bank of \$833.68.
