ARRIVED OCT.—The brigantine May E. Bliss, Fanning, arrived at Santerando, Trinidad, on 15th, from Alberton, landing all of her deck load, including four next-day in fair condition. Captain Fanning reports a lot of heavy weather during the passage.

HARBOR LIGHT.—One of the most pleasant times in the history of the Harbor Light, was spent on Saturday evening, through the kindness of a number of ladies and gentlemen from Zion's church, who attended amply provided to make the moments fly quickly.

MORAL REFORM.—Some of the society leaders of St. Joseph, Mo., have been indicted by the grand jury for renting apartments to lewd and disorderly houses. Women as well as men have been taken on warrants for the offence.

Chief Brown, of the Pittsburgh, Pa., department of public safety, has issued an order for the closing of all houses of ill-reputation in that city. The order was issued by direction of Mayor Gorstley and is a result of a movement against the social evil recently started by the ministers of Pittsburgh.

MORE SHIPMENTS.—On Friday morning, Mr. John Henry sent away twenty-five very fine breeding ewes for Calais, Maine. They were Shropshires and Leicesters.

On the previous morning Mr. Henry also shipped 200 lambs for Brighton, and Mr. John Leyden 170. In marking his sheep Mr. Henry uses a very simple yet expedient marker—his own invention. On Saturday Mr. W. B. Bowness, of New Annap, shipped to Moncton a trotter—at least Mr. Bowness affirms the beast could trot.—Pioneer.

SERVILE LABOR.—Another case of servile labor on the Sabbath is to be brought against the Halifax Railway Co. In the last case the charge was brought against drivers but this time the president and secretary of the company will be made defendants. The information in this case will, it is understood, be laid by a gentleman who has been prominent in Evangelical Alliance circles. The case will be brought in the police court first.

WANTS HIS CHILD.—A man named Charles Watling appeared at the police court this forenoon asking for information as to how he should proceed in the matter of regaining possession of his little daughter who is now in the custody of a man named J. W. Matheson.

Watling said that on the death of his wife, some two years ago, he gave the child to Matheson to board. Now he understands that the child is being ill-treated and wants to regain possession of her, but Matheson refuses to give her up. Watling was advised to retain the services of a lawyer; as it was not a matter for the interference of the police court.

ST. DUNSTON'S CATHEDRAL.—The men's mission closed last evening at seven o'clock, with the recital of the beads, the Papal Benediction, Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament, and an able and scholarly sermon on "The Rule of Faith," by Rev. Father Doherty, S. J. The mission throughout was very successful, about 2,300 women and 1,700 men receiving Holy Communion during the two weeks. Fathers Doherty and O'Bryan will leave here on Wednesday morning for Springhill, N. S., where they will co-act a mission. Father Doherty is a native of St. John and Father O'Bryan belongs to Halifax.

SCOTT ACT IN MONCTON.—A recent despatch says: There is likely to be a lively time in Moncton within the next few weeks. Mr. Rawlings of St. John is now doing police duty, but although appointed as a policeman, it is well known that his duty is really more in the nature of a Scott act inspector. The council, it appears, did not care to appoint a Scott act inspector, and as the regular police could not or would not enforce the law it was decided to appoint Mr. Rawlings. His appointment is for a month, and it is supposed that his continuance in the service will depend altogether upon the degree of success achieved. The action of the council has created quite a breeze among the liquor dealers, who are not a bit more anxious for law than other people.

POLICE COURT.—This morning a colored man named Benj. Byers, was arraigned on complaint of his wife to answer a charge of assault and battery. The assault was committed on Saturday. Mrs. Byers said her husband came home drunk on Saturday morning about one o'clock, and from that hour until six he beat and otherwise ill-treated her. In the afternoon he also ill-treated her, and tried to prevent her from going to the police station to make a complaint. Byers pleaded guilty to the charge, and said that if given a chance he would do better in the future. Byers has been twice convicted during the past year for the same offence. His Honor gave him five months imprisonment with hard labor. William Corish (sobriquet) was given two months' imprisonment with hard labor for assaulting a young girl named Izetta Bridges, on the 19th ult. The little girl said that Corish met her on Sydney Street, near the Methodist Church, on a dark night, and put his arm around her. She screamed and broke away from him. Corish admitted that what the girl said was correct, but said he did not mean any harm by his action. The Marshal informed the court that there had been several complaints made to him in reference to Corish's conduct towards ladies on the street. The complaint against Corish was laid by the Marshal.
