

# Fish And Game Meeting Last Night At Victoria

A regular meeting of the Queen's County branch of the E. I. Fish and Game Association was held at Victoria last night with a good attendance of members and people from Victoria and surrounding districts. A number of new members joined during the course of the meeting.

Mr. Erskine MacNutt, President of the Queen's County Branch presided. Mr. MacNutt said that it was the practice of the Queen's County Branch to hold meetings in different parts of the County and that the next meeting would be held at Mount Stewart. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

When the item of new business came up a general discussion took place in regard to the possibility of some type of construction taking place which would maintain a high water level in the area inside the old bridge which forms the short-cut to Hammonds. The opinion was generally expressed that this would prove to be quite an addition to the tourist attractions of the area especially in improving trout fishing and propagation of game birds. It would also make a very fine protected place for sail boats and small motor boats.

In reply to a question as to what effect such dam construction would have on smelt fishing, a reply was made by one man who said he had been fishing in and around Victoria practically all his life and that smelt fishing was very small and he was of the opinion there would be no detrimental effect whatsoever.

Finally a resolution was unanimously passed that a request be

made to Federal and Provincial authorities to have the whole question properly studied at the earliest possible moment. Among those taking part in the discussion were Mr. Neil Matheson, M.P., Mr. W. P. Allan, Stewart, M.L.A., Mr. Frank Myers, M.L.A., and Mr. J. B. G. MacNutt, M.L.A.

The aims and general work of the Maritime Wildlife Federation were outlined to the meeting by Mr. F. A. Stewart Jones, President, and Mr. B. Graeme Rogers, Secretary. This organization is Maritime in scope and is also closely connected with similar organizations in the New England States.

Two very fine colored movie films were shown, one of which dealt with caribou and grouse hunting in Newfoundland and the other with sport fishing in Ontario.

A resolution was passed thanking B. Graham Rogers for conducting the Fish and Game Radio program during last winter and spring. The program for this fall and winter will be carried on by Mr. Thomas Lothian.

A very cordial invitation was extended by Mr. Erskine MacNutt, president of the Queen's County Branch, to those present to attend any meetings of the Association no matter in what particular locality they might be held. He also said that the good attendance at this meeting was evidence of the growing interest all over the Province in Fish and Game matters as well as conservation of all natural resources.

# Moneymen Edge Islanders 5-4 In Overtime; Move Into Second Position

The Sydney Millionaires jumped into sole possession of second place in the Maritime Major Hockey League last night by shanding the Charlottetown Islanders 5-4 on Ray LaCroix's breakaway goal after three minutes and twenty-five seconds of overtime play.

Centreman Roger Guay sent LaCroix into the clear with a long forward pass to centre ice. LaCroix streaked down the ice well in the clear and deked goalie Roger Bessette before slipping the disc into the crease for the clincher.

The Islanders themselves had victory within their grasp earlier in the overtime session. Paul Sandin sent Merv Towers into the clear but Norman Defelice in the Sydney cage made a sprawling save.

LaCroix's game winning marker over-shadowed a great three goal performance by the Islanders Bob Gray. Winger Paul Sandin accounted for the Islanders other goal.

In addition to scoring the winner, LaCroix set up Guay for the Moneymen's fourth goal by a third period shot that drew the Sydney team up on even terms with the Islanders.

LaCroix and Guay each scored two goals for the Millionaires and veteran centreman George Robertson one. Defenceman Bill Tysko bitterly protested one of Guay's goals claiming that the Sydney player kicked the puck into the cage. Goalie Roger Bessette backed up the statement in the dressing room after the game.

Both clubs suffered a loss in offensive power early in the first period when Buck Whitlock and Claude Beaupre were ejected from the game for fighting in the penalty box.

The fight started inside the Sydney zone midway between the blue line and the net. Beaupre threw several punches before Sydney's big Dunc MacIntyre intervened and broke up the battle. Referee Cy Taylor tagged both players with majors.

They were no sooner seated in the penalty box before the fight was renewed with Whitlock getting the better of the exchange.

# Sport Echoes From Prince County

Bad weather conditions are hampering the work at the site of the new Summerside rink. Delightful days had prevailed for two weeks, but whenever the construction gang started to go, the weather man got cantankerous and the rainy day that had made a rather disappointing summer came back into action. He fell on the save and Gray got the rebound to fire the puck over the prostrate goaltender.

Five minutes later while the Islanders played a man short Ray LaCroix converted Dunc MacIntyre's goal mouth pass to even the count once more.

But Gray raced back to put the Islanders out front. Coach Wes Trainor carried the puck into the Sydney zone and lost it along the boards. Gray followed up to grab the disc and score on a hard shot.

At the 15:06 mark of the period Guay took advantage of some loose Islanders clearing to knot the count at 3-3.

Sandin scored on a breakaway shortly before the period ended for the Islanders final goal. Rol and Pilon fired the puck up to centre ice where Sandin grabbed the disc, headed into the Sydney zone with Bill Matthew chasing him. He beat Defelice from 15 feet out.

In the third period Guay came out for the only goal after taking a goal mouth pass from LaCroix. The latter raced from end to end before putting the puck on Guay's stick.

The Islanders Kid Line of Darrington, Carver and Hennessey gave their best all-around display of the year although they failed to get in the scoring column. Darrington and Hennessey showed considerable improvement and both had several good scoring chances.

The defensive unit of Trainor and MacLaughlin played well for the locals while Sydney Duke McDonald played a sound game on the line with his coach Terry Reardon.

The Islanders leave today by car for Glace Bay. After playing the Bay tonight they move on to Halifax for a Saturday night contest. Buck Whitlock and Gus Gustavson are expected to join the team for the bout with the Atlantics.

Forward Marty Burton did not arrive yesterday as plane flights out of Montreal for Moncton were cancelled. He should be here as soon as the weather lifts.

Sydney coach Terry Reardon is well pleased with his club and expects to add more players to his lineup. If he gets enough defencemen he will put Dunc MacIntyre back up on the wing.

The Abbies, who have been working out each night all week, concentrated on scoring plays as coach Coyle attempted to insert a scoring punch in his heavy and well conditioned football squad.

The half liners have been working on five or six strategic plays and have them down pat for Saturday's contest. The boys went through the plays several times without a hitch last night and one or two of these plays could make the difference between winning and losing the series.

The Abbies will have a new backfielder in action Saturday in the person of George Kelly. It was a Kelly fellow from Saint John who wrecked the Abbies a year ago so this year the locals went out and got a Kelly of their own.

George played football with the Intermediate Saint Dunstan's team for several years. He is a raw-boned boy with plenty of speed and a good set of hands. He will play inside half.

The Abbies' scrum averages about 188 pounds and their backfield is nearly as heavy. In addition to being heavy the scrum is a smooth working unit as the boys demonstrated in their game against Glace Bay Caledonias two weeks ago.

In the front line of the scrum the Abbies have Eddie Devine, a former St. Dunstan's player who weighs about 185 pounds and rugged Joe Coyle who played with the St. Dunstan's second team for the past two seasons. They will flank the heater Claude Field who tips

# Canadiens Come From Behind In Third Period To Defeat Toronto 3-1

MONTREAL, (CP) — Defenceman Tom Johnson's two third-period goals gave Montreal Canadiens a 3-1 victory over Toronto Maple Leafs in a National Hockey League game Thursday night.

It was Montreal's sixth victory without a loss on home ice this season and brought out about the roughest play of all.

Referee Bill Chadwick handed out 18 penalties, including a match penalty to centre Elmer Lach of Canadiens for attempting to injure and a major penalty to George Armstrong of the Leafs for high sticking. Lach was injured in the rumpus and swung his stick at Armstrong who warded off the blow with his own stick. Armstrong's penalty, changed officially from fighting, carried an automatic fine of \$25. Lach's swinging cost him \$100.

Ken Mosdell scored Montreal's first goal midway through the opening period, picking up Lorne Davis' rebound at the side of the net and jamming the puck past goalie Harry Lumley.

Eric Nesterenko put the Leafs even at 8:35 of the second period, taking Fern Flaman's pass and beating Gerry McNeil when the Montreal goalie slid from his cage expecting a low shot from Flaman. Johnson took frequent turns at centre as well as filling in on his regular job at defence. His first goal, while the Leafs were short-handed early in the last period, came on a short pass from Richard in front of the net. The second, nine minutes later came on a close play just off the corner of the crease, also with Richard.

Toronto had only one shot on goal in the last period. It came in the final two minutes while the Canadiens were short-handed.

# U.S. Player Has Poor Opinion Of Canadian Football

PALO ALTO, Calif., (AP) — Frankie Albert, back from his first season of Canadian football, and what he says is his last season of Canadian football, thinks any good American professional club would "beat Canada's best team by 35 points."

The former quarterback of San Francisco 49ers of the National Football League circuit hastened to say that Canadian football is "not bad."

"They have some very good players up there but not enough on any one team to stack up with a good National League team here," the one-time Stanford star said.

Asked For Cut  
Albert joined Calgary Stampede for a salary of \$20,000. He said he voluntarily took a cut Oct. 1. The club won three, lost 12 and tied one to end up in last place in the Western Interprovincial Football Union.

Admitting he didn't "burn up" the league, the southpaw who sparked the 49ers for years, said "I spent most of my time running for my life. There were days when I didn't please the fans or club owners. But there were times when I thought I played some of the best football of my life."

Albert had high praise for treatment accorded the players.

"We travelled first class, he said. "Everything was top. And the Canadian fans are great."
