IN MEMORIAM

MRS. JOHN A. MCCARVILLE

On August 4th, 1950, there passed away peacefully at the Charlottetown Hospital, Mrs. John A. McCarville at the age of 66 years. She was formerly Annie Kelly, born at North Wiltshire daughter of Frank Kelly and Margaret Melver. At the age of three she moved to Newton where she lived with her aunt and uncle Susan and Peter Melver. In 1911 she married John A. McCarville, and they resided in Newton as a model Christian family, blessed with four children, in a home that will long be remembered as one in which charity reigned supreme.

Seven years ago Mr. McCarville died, and about three years ago Mrs. McCarville's health began to fail. Although she soon knew that she could not be cured, she suffered patiently, and calmly awaited the end. During the last months at home before she entered the Hospital finally in February, she was tenderly cared for by her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Cyril McCarville, formerly Mary Murphy of Hope River. Her happy death on the first day of August, surrounded by her loved ones and strengthened by the Prayers and Sacraments of the Church, was a fitting close to a beautiful Christian life.

Beneath a quiet and unassuming exterior her many friends found in Mrs. McCarville a heart of extraordinary sincerity in affection and generosity in kindness to others, especially in time of need. It was her family particularly who always received her primary attention, and they will now miss her affectionate devotion and interest in all their concerns. But she willingly shared the tasks of Parish activities and proved herself not only a very valued member of the community, but also a true friend to all.

Mourning the loss of their loving mother are three daughters: Sister Mary Rosari, St. Teresa's Convent; and Sister Mary Joanne, Western Hospital, Alberton, both of the Sisters of St. Martha; and Frances, Mrs. Albert Rowe, Fredericton; and one son, Cyril, at home. The surviving members of her immediate family are: three sisters, Maude, Borden; Frances and Margaret, Everett, Mass.; and two brothers, Emmett, Borden, P.E.I.; and Joseph, West Acton, Mass. One brother, Frank, predeceased her eleven years ago.

The funeral was held to St. Malachy's Church, Kinkora, on Monday, August 7th under the direction of Mr. P. A. Monaghan. Solemn Requiem Mass was offered by her Pastor, Reverend Francis McQuaid, assisted by Reverend Harold Croken, Deacon, and Reverend Vincent Murphy, S. J., Subdeacon. Reverend Basil Croken and Rev-

erend Eugene Murray assisted the choir. Seated in the Sanctuary were Reverend W. E. Monaghan, Reverend Fred Cass, Reverend Wilfred Koefe and Reverend Leonard McKenna. The pall-bearers were: Aiden Mulligan, John M. Mulligan, Walter Smith, Aiden Corr, John R. McCabe and Peter D. McIver. The large crowd of people assembled to pay their respects to the deceased and to pray for her gave silent testimony that a "valiant woman" had passed to her reward.

Changes In N. S. Cabinet

HALIFAX, Sept. 1 - (CP)-Premier Angus L. Macdonald of Nova Scotia has announced several changes in his Liberal Cabinet.

Harold Connolly, Minister of Trade and Industry, was named Minister of Health and Welfare. A. H. MacKinnon has resigned the Health and Welfare portfolios but retains the Labor Ministry. The Liberal Party Whip from Shelburne, W. T. Daughinee, was named Minister of Trade and Industry, but Mr. Connolly will continue to hold the office of Tourist and Publicity.

A. E. DeWolfe, Liberal member of the Legislature for Pictou Centre, becomes Minister without Portfolio. Mr. MacKinnon is also Minister of Mines.

President Truman Gives MacArthur Pat On Bac

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1 - (AP) - President Truman sent Gen. Douglas MacArthur a pat-on-the-back message for his conduct of the Korean war and a broad hint that the White House is determined to run United States foreign policy without interference. The President's action came less than 24 hours after the White House confirmed that Truman had personally ordered MacArthur to withdraw a controversial statement on Formosa, the island refuge of Chiang Kai-Shek's Chinese Nationalist Government.

Although administration officials declined comment, Truman's letter to MacArthur apparently was designed: 1. To clarify MacArthur's understanding of White House policy and remind him to keep in line. 2. To soften the sting of the incident to the General and also to bulwark MacArthur's prestige-or "face"-in the Orient. In his letter to MacArthur today, Truman wrote: "I am sending you for your information the text of a letter which I sent to (U.N.) Ambassador Austin dated August 27. 'I am sure that when you examine this letter... you will understand my action on the 26th in directing the withdrawal of your message to the Veterans of Foreign Wars was necessary. 'General Collins and Admiral Sherman have given me a comprehensive report of their conversations with you and of their visit to the United Nations forces now fighting under your command in Korea. 'Their reports were most satisfactory and highly gratifying to me.'"

Gen. J. Lawton Collins, army chief of staff, and Admiral Sherman recently returned from a conference with MacArthur in Tokyo. In his Aug. 27 letter to Ambassador Warren Austin, Truman reaffirmed American policy as follows: The United States has no designs on Formosa; the U.S. Seventh Fleet was sent to guard Formosa from invasion by Chinese Communists to keep the war from spreading; and Formosa's future is a question for international settlement.

MacArthur had sent a message to the Veterans of Foreign Wars convention in Chicago setting forth a policy which Truman obviously feared might be interpreted as calling for permanent American defence of Formosa. The message had not been cleared by the State Department, and at Truman's order MacArthur told the V.F.W. convention he was withdrawing it with "regret."

TORONTO, Sept. 1 - (CP) - Two bandits today threw red pepper into the face of William G. Sinclair, president of the Sinclair-Ferguson Construction Company and robbed him of a \$5,000 payroll, police said. Sinclair told police that the thieves, at least one of whom was armed, accosted him in front of an incinerator on Keele Street in suburban North York Township.
