Millions of Chinese Peasants Are Aiming at Big Grain Crop

By ADAM KELLOTT - LONG PEEKING (Reuters) — Red China's 400,000 peasants are battling to bring in a satisfactory grain harvest and make up for losses of the last three years, officials blamed on floods, drought and pests.

A fourth successive bad harvest could have a serious effect on an already tight food situation for China's millions and cause further disruption in the communist bloc.

Meanwhile, the move to shift experienced officials back to the lower rural agricultural units has continuing unabated, according to newspaper articles here.

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SHOW MORE REALISM

In contrast to the heady atmosphere of the post-1958 bumper harvest, Communist planners are showing an attitude of sober realism toward agricultural problems while publicly continuing to place their faith in the commune system.

The main article in Red Flag, the party's fortnightly theoretical journal appearing here last week, said study of the best methods of agricultural production was the "long, arduous task before us."

Careful and slow experimentation plus "solidification and soundness in the people's communes where peasants now are busy planting all available space with autumn grain in an effort to recoup losses."

'Legislature of North' Meets To Consider Site For Capital

OTTAWA (CP)—The legislature of the north meets at Cape Doris today to consider the village some 1,300 miles north of Montreal, to resume its task of creating two new Arctic territories.

The 10-member Northwest Territories council will consider four sites for the capital of the proposed Mackenzie territory and eight Eskimo names for the second proposed territory, in the eastern Arctic.

The council is running for selection as capital of the more populous, more developed Yukon Territory are Yellowknife, Inuvik, Fort Smith, and Fort Simpson.

Boundaries of the embryonic territories were drawn in January at the council's annual session last month. The council's stretch from the Yukon Territory border eastward to the Mackenzie border at the centre of Saskatchewan's northern boundary to the north of Manitoba.

WOULD BE HUGE AREA

The Eskimo-named territory would encompass all land and islands east of the 108th meridian and north of Manitoba.

The council's summer session will last for five days or longer, meeting in the new community hall at Cape Doris, just off the southwest tip of Baffin Island.

The council will debate five new ordinances (bills) and 12 amendments to existing legislation.
