**TEST YOUR PLAY**

1. You are declarer with the West hand at Six Notrump. North leads the ten of hearts. How would you play the hand?

2. You are declarer with the West hand at Four Hearts. North leads the six of hearts. How would you play the hand?

1. The only problem is how to handle the clubs so as to obtain our tricks in the suit. After ruffing the heart in dummy, the percentage play is to lead the six of clubs and duck if South follows low.

If the six wins the trick, repeat the finesse by playing the seven from dummy. If the six loses to the jack or queen, win any return and play the king of clubs, in which event the contract becomes certain if North follows-suit.

The only case in which this method of play fails is when North wins the singleton heart or queen. If you were to attack the club suit by first leading the king, or the ace, you

**Residential Building Slips From 1964 Pace**

The overall pattern of Canada's building industry, a key factor in the country's growth, continues to grow but residential construction is slipping from last year's pace.

The monthly report of the Southern Building Guide shows that residential construction awards in the first two months of this year rose \$75,000,000 to \$635,221,000 compared with the first two months of 1964.

In residential construction, however, contracts declined to \$183,740,000 this year compared with \$207,211,000 in 1964—a drop of 11.3 per cent.

The fall-off was sharper in February, when contracts awarded declined 20.5 per cent to \$85,400,000, compared with \$107,000,000 in February of 1964. In January the decline was 5.4 per cent.

There was a decrease noted in overall awards for the two months in the Maritimes and prairie regions. Total awards were off a minute 4 per cent, and prairie contracts 18.8 per cent. British Columbia managed a slight 14-per-cent increase.

Other segments, however, continued strong.

**FIGURES RISE**

Business construction rose 59 per cent to \$99,475,000. In structural 27.2 per cent to \$123,866,000; engineering 26.5 per cent to \$161,838,000 and industrial 17.7 per cent to \$66,300,000.

By region, the Maritimes were off \$90,900 at \$22,690,800; Quebec up \$55,409,000 at \$214,100,000; Ontario up \$33,497,000 at \$291,33,000; the prairies off \$14,614,000 at \$63,311,000; and British Columbia up \$899,000 at \$53,475,000.

Elsewhere on the business scene J. R. Timmins and Co. stockbrokers reported first-quarter dividend payments by Canadian companies, buoyed by increased dividends from some large companies, were at a record level.

They totalled \$282,152,486, a 13-per-cent increase over the \$249,340,927 paid in the first quarter of 1964. The four groups—industrials, mines, utilities and institutional organizations—were all higher.

Among the companies that have increased dividends are International Nickel Co. of Canada Ltd., Noranda Mines Ltd., Imperial Oil Ltd., Aluminium Ltd. and Royal Bank of Canada.

analysis on known revenue and expenditure factors and makes an effort to predict tax changes, says a deficit in the next fiscal year of \$250,000,000 to \$400,000,000 is likely.

It also sees a deficit for the current fiscal year of about \$148,000,000 instead of the \$155,000,000 originally predicted by Mr. Gordon in his budget address last March 16.
