TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.]

Letter From General Gordon.

CAIRO, Sept. 18. The Khedive, Nubar Pasha, and Sir Evelyn Baring, British representatives in Egypt, have received an identical cypher despatch from Gen. Gordon. The despatch left Khartoum, Aug. 26, and reads as follows:—"I am awaiting the British forces in order to relieve the Egyptian garrison. Send me Zubeir, pay him a yearly salary of £3,000. I shall surrender the Sudan to the Sultan directly 20,000 Turkish troops arrive. If the rebels kill Egyptians you are answerable for the bloodshed. I require £30,000 to pay my soldiers, my daily expenses being £1,500. Within a few days I shall take B. Berber, where I have sent Col. Stewart, Col. Power and the French Consul with troops and Bashi-Bazouks, who, after staying a fortnight, will burn the town and return to Khartoum. Col. Stewart will then go to the Equator, via Dongola.

The Comments of the Press.

LONDON, Sept. 18. The News gives this version of Gen. Gordon's letters, five of which have been received. Gen. Gordon asks the Government to send Turkish troops to occupy Sudan and to retain £50,000. The alternative proposed was to make Zubeir, King of Sudan with a salary of £30,000, Sudan being held as the key of Egypt. This being accomplished, Gen. Gordon would return to England.

News from China.

LONDON, Sept. 18. A despatch from Hong Kong to the Times says: "A French man-of-war at Alante boarded a regular Hong Kong trading junk and threw its cannon, guns, and ammunition overboard. This occurred in the immediate vicinity of the harbor. The merchants of Hong Kong are greatly irritated. Junking is the only trade left, and junk men are afraid to venture outside the harbor without cannon for fear of pirates. The disgust at the intrusion of the French is increasing daily.

The Cholera.

PARIS, Sept. 18. There have been over ten thousand cases of cholera since the outbreak in France. Half of which have died. The disease seems to be subsiding.
