HYDROPHOBIA FEARED.—While THE EXAMINER'S reporter was this morning interviewing Dr. Beer with reference to the accident to Mr. and Mrs. Hooper, referred to elsewhere, the Dr. in the course of some comments upon the fact that a large number of dogs are allowed to run at large in and about the city, expressed the opinion that if facilities are not provided for dogs to drink during the hot weather and in the absence of pumps there is imminent danger of an epidemic of hydrophobia. Besides the public drinking facilities referred to by the Dr. owners of dogs should see that their animals are watered at intervals. Charlottetown has never yet had a case of hydrophobia, and it is hoped it will not be allowed to obtain a footing here now. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. Fire in a Telegraph Office. New York, July 18. This morning, shortly before 7 o'clock, flames burst from a switch board of the Western Union operating room, on the seventh floor of the building on the corner of Broadway and Dey Streets. So rapidly did they extend that escape of the employes by the stairways was cut off, and a number were lowered from the windows by means of ropes to the tops of the adjoining buildings. So far as now known there was no loss of life. The upper floors of the building are practically ruined by flames, and the whole building is completely drenched with water. The operating room, with its multitude of costly instruments, is a total loss. The results attending the fire are likely to prove disastrous to the business of the country. Not a telegraph wire can be connected with the great operating room, which is the centre of the telegraphic system of the continent. The offices of the Associated Press and the executive offices of the Western Union Telegraph Co. are completely wiped out, as are those of Jay Gould and the Pacific Telegraph. Ottawa Notes. OTTAWA, July 17. Elastic, rubber, thread, calcareous tufa, for the manufacture indurated fibre ware, rolled iron tube, angle iron, lacquered iron tubing for the manufacture of bedsteads, hemm paper, primers and felt board for the manufacture of gun wads, and cartridges have been placed on the free list until such time as they are manufactured in Canada. Henderson, a local barrister, to-day wrote the Minister of Militia, claiming the sum of \$5,365 and interest from 1885 on behalf of Bremner for loss of his furs during the rebellion. He also claims \$14,000 for general losses sustained during the rebellion. Middleton emphatically declares that he will not pay for the furs. Mr. Lemieux, a leading clerk in the Department of Agriculture, was drowned in the Ottawa River to-day. Canadian Riflemen Abroad. TORONTO, July 18. The following is a special cable to the Empire: "Four of the Canadian twenty have secured places in the 300 who will fire in the second stage of the match for the Queen's prize at Bisley. They are Lieut. Smith, of St. John, N. E., Staff-Serjt. Ogg, of Guelph, Capt. Bishop, of Halifax, and Sergt. Hall, of Waterloo, Quebec. In the next hundred, there were three Canadians, Lieut. Hora, of Kingston, Lieut. Manning, of St. John, N. B., and Private Hutcheson, of Ottawa. These three retire from the competition with prizes of £2 each. 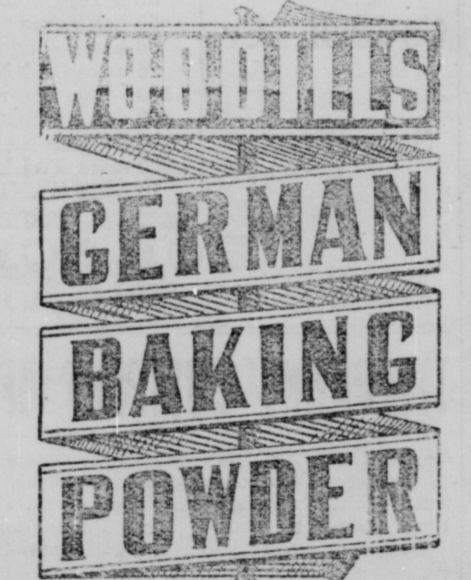
