Traffic Is Halted By Ground Drift

Drifting snow was very heavy on the highways in Eastern Prince County Sunday, a day early last evening all departments of the transportation were called in, unable to cope with the blowing winds which piled snow as high as 10 feet on many sections of the county's main roads.

The duty forecaster at RCMP Station Summerside said that about nine inches of snow fell in the area between 2 p.m. Saturday and 5 a.m. Sunday. The snow was "wet" in several areas and it did not fall heavily at any time during the period.

Winds were recorded at 40 mph with gusts to 50 Sunday afternoon, but they were expected to decrease to 20 mph with gusts to 25 late last night. The temperature in Summerside at 9 p.m. Sunday was 17 degrees and was expected to fall to a low of five degrees during the night.

Two serious accidents, one in which three persons were killed, were attributed to heavy winds. (See story on page one.) No other accidents of more than \$100 damage were reported to Eastern RCMP or Summerside.

The RCMP reported that a 1963 model car driven by Edward Earl Lewis of Charlottetown was involved in the crash.

There were no injuries and damage to the two vehicles was estimated to be \$300.

WESTERN POLICE STREETS IN SUMMERSIDE WERE REPORTED VERY BUSY LAST NIGHT.

Highway plows were called out on town emergencies Sunday, the first time at 4 a.m. to assist in the transportation of an expectant mother from Kensington to Prince County Hospital in Summerside.

Neither Maritime Electric nor Island Telephone reported any line difficulties in the County over the weekend. There was, however, considerable snow on lines in various areas.

The Soviet delegation headquarters confirmed that 36-year-old Yuri Nosenko disappeared last Tuesday. It said it had no other information about him.

INNSBRUK, Austria (AP)—Ute Gashler, 23-year-old secretary who came to the Winter Olympics here as a substitute for the East German women's tobogganist, was killed Saturday night and detected in West Germany, West German sources reported.

Her flight also brought out the fact from Innsbruck police that 13 tourists from Communist East European countries have also detected after coming here to witness the 12-day Olympic Games and asked asylum in Austria. They were seven Hungarians, five Czechs and an East German doctor.
