He praised him highly for his integrity and thanked all the people of the county for the fine support they had given him.

"This will probably be the last occasion that I shall speak to you as leader" he said. "There has been much agitation for some time that the question of leadership should be settled. I have no apologies" Dr. MacMillan said there has been a cry that "he can't win," but he had won the city of Charlottetown, in six out of seven elections where one-fifth of the population of the Province resides.

He suggested that the reason for some of the party defeats might be found in the poll organizations. He said he had never asked for the leadership and he had gone into politics in the first place only to get a grant for the Red Cross. He recounted the many benefits that he obtained for the Province while he was in the Government and said, "I have tried to do my best for the Province but the people want a change. I am satisfied. I have had splendid support from my colleagues and the party." He mentioned particularly in this regard Messrs. R. R. Bell and D. L. Mathieson who had both been "staunch supporters" and who were present at the meeting.
