CONNAUGHT RANGES, SOUTH MARCH, ONT. — A number of Island marksmen are among the top group of more than 600 Canadian Marksmen seeking top berths in the Grand and Bisley Aggregates at Canadian Rifle Association's prize meet here.

At the close of Wednesday's shooting Tpr. Eldon MacLean of Charlottetown was leading the Islanders with 355 out of a possible 375 points. He was followed by WO2 Mike Susick, Summerside 354, Tpr. Edgar Jones, Charlottetown 353, Lt. Ralph Jenkins, Charlottetown 351, Tpr. Ronnie Clark, Charlottetown 349 and Tpr. Harold Jones, Summerside 346.

**Island-Born Barrister Dies In N.Y.**

Alder Brehaut, 90, a veteran Island born barrister, died July 22 in Tompkins County Hospital, Ithaca, N. Y. Word was received here by a sister, Minnie Owen.

Mr. Brehaut practiced law in Canada until he was 80 and was the second lawyer to be admitted to the Bar in the province of Saskatchewan.

He was born in Murray Harbor, son of the late George and Margaret Brehaut and was graduated from Prince of Wales College. He also studied at Dalhousie University in Halifax, Nova Scotia.

He is survived by his wife, Evelyn Owen Brehaut; two daughters, Mrs. Anthony J. Schultz of Brooktondale and Mrs. Elizabeth M. Sweetnam of Ithaca; four grandchildren; a sister, Cora Brehaut of Vancouver, B.C.; two brothers, John of Guernsey Cove, Prince Edward Island and Hammond Brehaut of Detroit, Mich.; nieces and nephews.

**Shaw Praises His Cabinet**

Premier Walter R. Shaw yesterday expressed confidence in the ability of his cabinet to carry on government affairs while he is away on a two-month holiday in the United Kingdom.

Cabinet members and their wives Wednesday night gave a farewell party in honor of Premier and Mrs. Shaw.

The premier said yesterday "I have every confidence in my cabinet. Individually and collectively they are at the top level of worthy and intelligent citizens. Each is imbued with a spirit of dedication to the

work he administers in his department.

"With due respect to previous cabinets, I don't think we ever had one that has such a fine balance and that has such a fine grasp on the problems of government and interests of the people.

"And with the confidence I possess in the cabinet, after being associated with it for five years, I am leaving the province for a rest, assured the affairs of the government will be conducted with care and efficiency during my absence."

TOKYO (AP)—Culture Minister Andre Malraux of France left Peking for home Thursday, the New China news agency reported. He had been in China since July 19. Western reports from Peking said Malraux conferred for a total of seven hours with Mao, President Liu Shao-Chi, Premier Chou En-lai and Foreign Minister Chen Yi.

**Gas Company Studying Work Here**

A two-day study of previous work done in the province on oil and gas exploration work has just been completed by the Hudson Bay Oil and Gas Company of Calgary, Alta.

Donald Burt, a geophysicist with the company, made studies of records in the department of industry and natural resources.

The company has licensed a large part of this province from Bloomfield to East Point and expects to begin some active exploration work by September. It is believed this first work will likely be geophysical. The company also has licenses in Northumberland Strait which will be explored, as well as some offshore rights adjoining the north shore of P.E.I.

Other companies which have licenses here are Texaco Exploration, Imperial Oil and California Standard.
