Montreal Stocks

MONTREAL (CP)—The Montreal and Canadian stock exchanges swung upwards in late trading to close irregularly higher in quiet industrial trade.

Papers were a standout as Howard Smith, Great Lakes, Bathurst and Abitibi all climbed a point. Stelco led steels generally higher, jumping 1 1/2. Aluminum added 1/2 but the rest of the base metals were off in a 1/2-point range.

Among the refining oils McColl dropped 1 1/2 while B.A. added 3/4. Calgary Power advanced 1/2 in the utilities as Commerce and Nova Scotia gained major fractions among the banks. Walker improved 3/4 in the banking group. On the miscellaneous list Argus and Simpson were point winners. Dominion Tar, Dominion Bridge and Canadian Vickers traded on minor fractions.

Mines moved irregularly lower in quiet trading. Westville, Portage, Quebec Smelting and Haitian lost under five cents while Montgomery jumped 20 cents.

The stock exchange's closing averages show banks at 0.09 at 51.96, utilities off 0.3 at 139.1, industrials up 2.3 at 294.0, combined up 1.4 at 242.3, papers up 16.94 at 1446.09 and golds off 0.30 at 79.40.

N. Y. STOCKS

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market came to life in the closing half hour Wednesday to convert a sluggish rise into a vigorous rally.

Many leading stocks advanced from one to three points and a few exceptions stepped beyond this. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks rose 1/16 to \$178.80.

Based on the average, the quoted value of stocks listed on the New York stock exchange rose about \$2,300,000,000.

The final spurge boosted volume to 1,620,000 shares. While the final game of the world series was a distraction during the afternoon and doubtless contributed to early sluggishness, the upsurge began well before the Yankees beat the Dodgers by a top-heavy score. Brokers could not tie the rally to any specific development.

The day's most active stock was American Telephone, up 3/4 at 106 1/2 on 48,700 shares. Second was Avco, unchanged at 5 1/4 on 29,100 shares. Third was General Motors, up 1/4 at 48 1/4.

Next came U.S. Steel, up 1 1/4 at 68 1/4 and Columbia Gas, unchanged at 17 1/4.

There was not a single loser among the 15 most active stocks. The American stock exchange was higher on volume of 640,000. Gainers included Creole Petroleum, A and P, Imperial Oil of Canada and Mead Johnson.

International Nickel advanced 1 1/2 to be the top gainer among Canadian issues on the New York exchange. Aluminum Ltd. was up 1 1/2 and Hudson Bay gained one point. Among gainers of less than a point were Canadian Pacific and Dome Mines. McIntyre lost 1/2.

Among Canadian issues on the American exchange Shawinigan went up 1/2. Molybdenite of Canada gained 1-1/8. On the downside, Scurry-Rainbow Oil and Fureka lost 1-1/8.

MRS. CHRISTINA MacLEOD

On July 22nd, 1956, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Roy McGee there passed peacefully away, Mrs. Christina MacLeod, widow of the late Angus MacLeod.

Born on Glasgow Road on September 28th, 1866, she deceased was the daughter of the late Alexander and Margaret Campbell, (Margaret MacCallum). After her marriage she and her husband spent their early married life in Glasgow Road, then moving to Charlottetown, where Mr. MacLeod conducted a grocery business on Upper Queen Street.

She was buried by the side of her husband in Brookfield Cemetery. Pallbearers were six grandsons: Allison, Emerson, Claude, Fred, Daniel and James MacLeod.

Left to mourn are two daughters, Letha, Mrs. Frank Coles of Nahant, Mass., and Ena, Mrs. Roy McGee, Charlottetown. Several grandchildren also live to cherish her memory.

The floral tributes were numerous and speak of the love and respect in which the deceased was held.

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Coalition Gov't Claims

Clean Sweep In Honduras

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras (AP)—The ruling government coalition today claimed a clean sweep in Honduras' violent election, but the opposition Liberal Party called the balloting a fraud.

The assembly is expected to name acting president Julio Lopez if his supporters' victory claim is borne out in official returns.

At least 11 persons were killed in election day clashes Sunday. Nine others were wounded. Police charged the Liberals with responsibility for the violence. They said they attacked an army post at the banana town of Villanueva, scene of most of the casualties, and that a clash between Liberals and police in the capital was started by the opposition faction.

Eyewitnesses in Tegucigalpa, however, said they saw an officer in a jeep start the shooting at a crowd of Liberal supporters after a youth tossed an orange at police.

Lozano's National Union party and its allies, the Reformists, announced that they had won all 56 seats in the assembly. Election officials said they still had received no official returns.

Gary was allowed to go to a movie alone for the first time Saturday. He never returned. Police, assisted by members of the auxiliary force, scoured back alleys, gardens and deserted lots during the Thanksgiving weekend.

Police forces in the southern United States have been asked to check a train which left here Saturday night carrying a circus company which appeared in Toronto's Maple Leaf Gardens. The train was bound for Georgia.

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
