

# Town Council Endorses Project Finishing Plan

**SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN**—A recommendation by the Central Centennial Committee that Summerside's Centennial fountain be completed this year was heartily endorsed by the town council at its regular monthly meeting last night.

The fountain was originally slated to be completed in two stages, the first in 1961 and the second in 1967. It was moved by the council that all necessary arrangements be made to complete both stages, including flags and plaques, by the official opening July 1.

A hydraulic test will be made on the fountain this morning and complete assurance has been given that the contractor's portion of the project will be completed in time for the slated inaugural day.

Deputy Mayor Leo Wood presided at last night's meeting in the absence of Mayor W. E. Jenkins, who is entering hospital for a routine check-up today. Also absent from the meeting was Town Clerk John Cameron, Assistant Town Clerk Mary Nicholson acted in this capacity.

Would the amendment be a free-vote? asked the opposition leader.

"... If he produces a motion concerning the action of the government in this matter, he can draw my own conclusions," said Mr. Pearson.

Earlier, the prime minister said: "I have pointed out, and I think I should make it quite clear, that when the government submits to Parliament a matter of policy—and this is certainly a matter of policy—the government must stand or fall on the result of the decision of the House."

But because this is a question so personal, so close to the conscience and deep in the emotions of members, it had been made clear that "a member of the Liberal party, in voting against the design submitted by the government, would not be read out of the party for so doing."

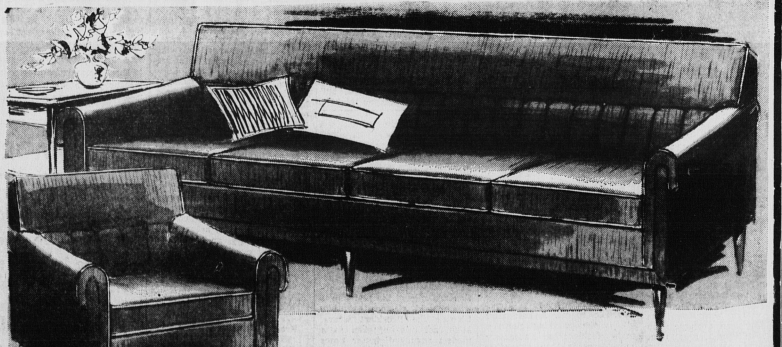
