POSTPONED UNTIL 30TH.—On account of the storm the Oddfellows' Excursion to Pugwash is deferred until next Monday, July 30th. The pilot, who arrived from Pugwash for the occasion, returned home this morning and is again engaged for the trip.

NO EAR FOR MUSIC.—Miss Nora Gardner, of Brooklyn, Hants County, N. S., was attacked and badly bitten by a dog one day last week, while performing on an organ in her father's residence. Her music had evidently no charms for that particular dog.

A FOUR WINGED BIRD.—An exchange reports that a gosling was hatched last summer on a farm at Windsor, with four wings. The bird flourished and this summer is strolling around with three little goslings from her own eggs, each bearing a similar number of wings.

AT SOURIS.—The Norwegian barque Fred is at Souris, with salt. When discharged, she will be towed to Pugwash, by the steam tug, thus saving taking in ballast. Yesterday (Sunday), she flung out a large amount of bunting to the breeze, and looked exceedingly gay.

CASING A CLEVERMAN.—Previous to his departure from Point de Bute for his new station in the city of Halifax, the Rev. S. R. Ackman, was presented with an address, accompanied by an elegant gold-headed ebony cane, as a token of esteem from the young people of Point de Bute.

TIGNISH TEA.—The tea at Tignish, on Wednesday last, netted some \$1,700, (the gross receipts being \$2,300) the largest amount ever realized at a tea on the Island. There were between 5,000 and 6,000 people on the grounds during the day. The proceeds are to be devoted to the interior decoration of the chapel at Tignish.

THE WEEK'S FISHING.—Mackerel are reported as being plentiful, but few have yet been caught. Last week a few barrels were seized off Little Pond. The steam tug Ralph Bay, on Thursday evening, but only succeeded in getting one barrel. Off East Point and Campbell's Cove a few barrels of No. 1's were taken by the shore men. Last week's fishing was unsatisfactory, both to seiners and hook and liners.

A STEAM SEINER.—The little steamer Ralph, 15 horse power, of Sambro, N. S., is on the coast, ready to take a hand at seining mackerel. She is commanded by Peter Hamm, brother of the celebrated Nova Scotia oarsman, who, in company with Teemer, is soon to row a race in the United States that will attract general attention in the sporting world. E. Hamm, the father of the oarsman, is also on board. A hale and hearty old man is he, proud of his sons and fond of the sea.

SOURIS EAST.—Souris East, the eastern terminus of the P. E. I. Railway, now takes first rank among the rising towns of the Maritime Provinces. How speedily it has developed into its present proportions may be judged from the fact that only about seventy years ago it had but one resident householder, the late John Longpae. The next who settled there were the late Fidele Paquet, Peter Cheverie, Francis Lavie, John McPhee, John McDonald, Francis Cheverie, Neil McDonald, and Edward Keays. The first merchants who did business in Souris were J. Coughlan and Benjamin Barrs. Then came Shattuck & McKay, John McFarlane, McDonald & Walker, John Knight, Donald Beaton, &c. The first Roman Catholic Church that was built there was erected under the ministry of the Rev. "Father John," who resided at St. Margaret's. Don't forget the tea that is to come off at Souris on the 1st of August.

Terrible Murder.

MONTREAL, July 21.

For some time past there has been bad blood between Napoleon Michael and his brother-in-law, Jeremiah LaMontagne, who lived at Wolfstone, Quebec. Late last night the latter went to Michael's house, and without warning shot him three times, each bullet taking effect in his neck. Thinking Michael was dead LaMontagne carried him to a bed in the house, soaked the mattress with coal oil, and set fire to the cot. In a few moments Michael returned to consciousness and notwithstanding his horrible wounds, was able to throw himself off the burning bed and crawl out of the house where the sight of the fire had attracted a crowd of neighbors. A priest was immediately called, who, after administering the last rites of the church, received from Michel a declaration of the facts of the case. LaMontagne has fled from the neighborhood or he would be lynched.

Emperor William's Visit.

St. PETERSBURG, July 22.

The German Imperial visitors attended Lutheran service this morning and afterwards accompanied the Czar and Czarina to the castle chapel, where service was held according to the Russian liturgy. Splendid chorals were rendered by the court singers. The departure of the German Imperial party is postponed until Tuesday morning. An official messenger says that in proposing the health of the Emperor William at Krasnozlo, the Czar included in the toast, "His glorious army."

Fatal Railway Collision.

LYNCHBURG, Va., July 21.

A collision on the N. & W. Railway this morning, eight miles above the city, between freight and material trains, killed both engineers, one fireman and five men in the crew. Both engines and seven cars were demolished. Loss \$100,000.

The Moon's Eclipse.

NEW YORK, July 23.

The total eclipse of the moon was seen from this city under favorable circumstances, and satisfactory observations were made by the astronomers at Columbia College. The sky was cloudless throughout.

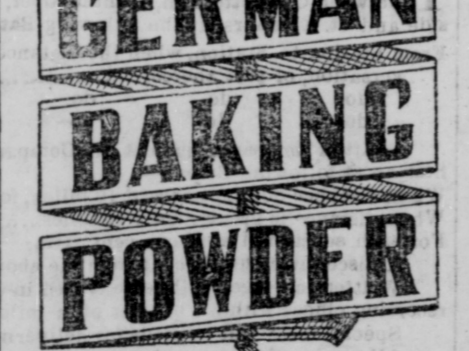
