Ski Resort King Killed In Fall At New York

NEW YORK, Sept. 13 — (CP) — Joseph B. Ryan, the man who turned Quebec's "Trembling Mountain" into a \$5,000,000 ski paradise, died today in a 22-storey plunge from his mid-town New York hotel room.

The wealthy scion of a Philadelphia family, Ryan visited Mont Tremblant in the Laurentians 12 years ago, climbed the steep-sloped mountain and liked what he saw. He poured his inherited wealth — an estimated \$5,500,000 — into carving out the miles of ski runs and tows that made Mont Tremblant the finest ski resort in Eastern Canada.

Early today his crumpled body was found on the pavement outside the Warwick Hotel. The 46-year-old man had either fallen or jumped.

There were rumors from sources close to the family that he had recently suffered financial reverses. It was known that he was trying to sell the ski resort. The construction and operation of Ryan's vast domain provided seasonal work for mountain folk who had previously relied for income on the woods or their scraggy farms.

His various new endeavors had received the blessing of the Roman Catholic Church through Rev. Charles Hector Deslauriers, parish priest.

It was Father Deslauriers' task to go to the imposing Ryan home and tell the widow, Mrs. Mary Ryan, of her husband's death. "He will be sorely missed in these parts," the priest said.

Ryan was the grandson of the late Thomas Fortune Ryan, multi-millionaire railroad builder and philanthropist, chequed in his pockets, along with some American money and a passport.

Ryan registered at the mid-town Manhattan hotel Monday night after an automobile trip from Quebec. He had about \$500 in travellers' cheques in his pockets, along with some American money and a passport.

Expect Sabotage Campaign In Western Germany

By Brack Curry FRANKFURT, Germany, Sept. 12 — (AP) — Western officials voiced alarm today that the opening gun in a do-or-die Communist sabotage campaign may be fired in Western Germany soon.

They estimated that at least 2-000 Communist fifth columnists—many of them graduates of Russian sabotage schools — have swarmed over the border from Red Germany. Some German authorities estimate the number as high as 15-000. Officials said it would take five army divisions to stop the flow of Communist agents across the long, heavily-wooded border.

The recent pattern of Communist activity, Allied sources said, indicates that the Kremlin has decided that the "nationalist resistance" campaign in Germany should be shoved forward soon from the propaganda to the direct action stage to disrupt the West's projected defence build-up.

A widespread series of Communist riots erupted in West Berlin, Frankfurt and Darmstadt Sunday. Communist violence broke out in Hamburg a few days earlier.

The Communists are expected to lash first at railroads and at factories producing for the West. If this succeeds, they would then strike at bridges and military installations.

Allied trains would be attacked since that would endanger few Germans.

Although the Communists have lost control of West German unions, die-hards still could carry out effective sabotage in many factories such as steel plants.

There are 150,000 to 180,000 card-carrying Communists in Western Germany—most of them factory workers.

SPANISH SYSTEM
