Summerside Stadium Will Open Next Week

According to Mr. Harold Gaudet, president of the Summerside Raceway and controller of the new Raceway Stadium, the opening of the new rink will take place on Monday, January 11, or thereafter, depending on how much cooperation the weather man gives. It is expected that a skate will be the opening activity.

Mr. Gaudet, in answer to inquiries, says it is possible Charlottetown Islanders will compete against another team of the "Big Four" at the rink this winter if arrangements suitable to both sides can be worked out.

The main stress this year, however, will be on skating, and the hockey program of the minor Summerside groups under the direction of James Hogan, Jr., director of Physical Fitness for Prince County. The seating capacity of the rink is about 2,500 with room for approximately 1,000 standees.

The ice surface is 190 by 85 feet. Heating and some other facilities will be on a temporary basis this year because of the fact that permanent construction cannot be started until the artificial ice plant is installed.

This will begin about the first of August next summer and is expected to take about two and a half months. In spite of the temporary nature of some of the facilities, however, the rink will this year have much better facilities than any other ice rinks in the vicinity.

The lighting is particularly good. The bulbs do not require shades. They are so frosted that the light is thrown on the ice from one bulb to cover a specific area, and the whole effect is such that you can literally see to pick up a pin on any part of the ice. Art Ross hockey nets have been ordered, and will soon be arriving at the new stadium.
