Hang Up Your Clothes In A Closet That's Tidy

Many jokes have been made about the family closet that attracts household surplus as inevitably as a mud puddle attracts a tiny tot.

The jokes may be amusing, but when clothes start to look bedraggled because of crowded quarters, a cluttered closet is no laughing matter.

So why not start now on a clean closet campaign? Your beautiful new fall fashions surely deserve a suitable closet space.

In order to keep your clothes clean and fresh, the closet itself should be well-organized and dust-free at all times.

Then, repeat this routine on shelves and drawers. A light coating of wax applied to wood shelves will make them easier to clean in the future.

Scrub the floor with thick suds and not too much water, rinse and wipe dry.

Sometimes it takes ingenuity to make the most of available closet space. So take a look at the accessories sold in most stores. These space savers often help to solve the problem very easily.

One smart investment that pays off in protection is a matching set

of accessories to hold garments, shoes, hats, scarves, gloves, blankets and so forth.

Not only do they keep these articles clean, but they are easy to keep clean, too. Also, they add an attractive note to the closet.

One of the prettiest sets is made of plastic and finished with a plump, stitchless quilting to give a three-dimensional effect.

Your store also carries a variety of rods and attachments that are effectively engineered to increase closet clothes capacity without overcrowding.

Then consider hangers. So often we've seen closets, beautifully fitted out in all but garment hangers, using, for the most part, the wire jobs from the dry cleaners with perhaps a few wooden coat hangers that are obviously hotel souvenirs!

Clothes hold their shape better when hung on properly shaped or padded hangers, so be sure to include them when you are doing over your closet.

Go over garment bags and eliminate those that are torn or in poor condition. Invest in as many good garment bags as possible and keep all your clothes under cover. Those that don't deserve garment bags at least deserve plastic shoulder covers to catch the dust. Both types of covers can be kept clean with a swish of a sudsy cloth. And since there are garment bags for suits, furs, blouses, you'll find it easy to keep every item of your wardrobe nicely protected.
