CHEESE

Resolution Against Feeding Turnips

The Cheese Board met today. Twenty-six factories boarded 6,215 cheese. New Dominion, Dundas and Cardigan sold to Mr H Hazard at 11 1/2 cents. Others refused to accept this price as follows: Hazlebrook, 175 boxes; Hillsboro, 290 boxes; Vernon River, 400 boxes; Orwell, 620 boxes; East River, 185 boxes; Mount Stewart, 100 boxes; St Peter's, 2,0 boxes.
The following resolution was passed unanimously:

Whereas, it has been found by Mr. Morrow, the Provincial Dairy Inspector, that there are already cases of injury done to the quality of our cheese by the feeding of turnips by our milk patrons and also by allowing their cows to graze on marsh land.

Therefore resolved that in order to guard against such or any lowering of the quality of cheese or butter from such causes, we hereby request and advise the Board of Directors of the P. E. Island Dairyman's Association to take legal proceedings against any patron or patrons found sending milk to any cheese or butter factory tainted from such feeding.
