

Rougies Retain 3rd Place In Defeating Argos

REGINA (CP) — Saskatchewan Roughriders, scoring 20 points in the last quarter, dropped Toronto 21-17.

The win kept Saskatchewan in third place in the Western Football Conference while Toronto remains in the Eastern Conference basement.

The winning touchdown came in the last minute of play when Saskatchewan quarterback Bob Placek threw a pass to halfback Ray Purdin at the roughriders 50. Purdin raced the rest of the way to complete the 80-yard pass-and-run play.

Halfback Bill Gray and fullback Ferd Burket scored the other Saskatchewan touchdowns. Rex Whitehouse kicked two converts and one single when a field goal attempt went wide.

Toronto scorers were end Aubrey Line and halfback Dick Shatto with touchdowns, and

Bill Mitchell with a field goal, a convert and a single.

CHARLOTTETOWN — St. Thomas Tommies, displaying their fast and hard-driving backfield and an almost impregnable line, defeated Prince Wales Raiders 16-0 at St. Dunstun's University field Saturday afternoon in a regular scheduled Atlantic Football Conference "B" game.

The contest was played in a continuation of the regular season in the vaunted St. Thomas aerial offensive, and generally making for poor ball handling. There were eight fumbles in all, five by PWC and three by St. Thomas. Two Welshman fumbles were recovered by the Tommies, and PWC recovered one St. Thomas miscue. None figured in the scoring.

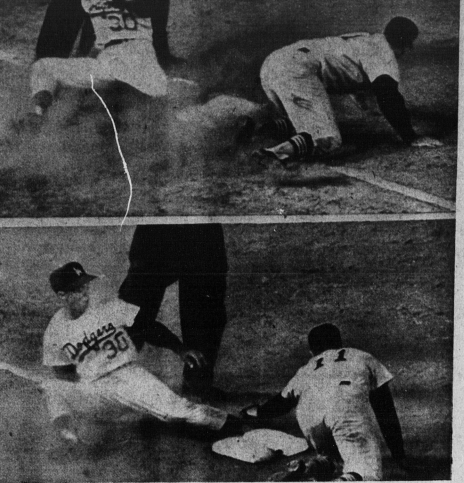

The Indians were tied with the Yankees for first place in the American League after the first week in July, and slumped badly thereafter, to sixth place.

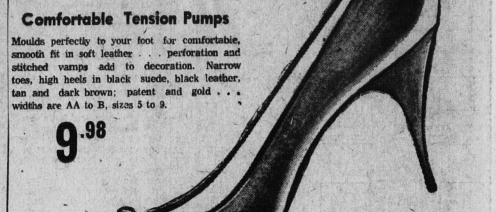
