Utilities Commission hears C.R.R. Application

Canadian National Transportation Ltd applied for a license to operate regular motor vehicle service between this province and the mainland, in a hearing yesterday before the P.E.I. Public Utilities Commission.

The petitioners, represented by F. A. Large, QC, stated that goods coming from Moncton to Charlottetown would arrive 25 hours earlier if they could be picked up by truck at Moncton, rather than remaining in Moncton 24 hours to wait for the following day's train which leaves Moncton at 5:40 p.m.

Charles C. Gillespie, Superintendent of highway services for the CNR, said that the Canadian National Transportation trucks operating in the province only on weekends as a special holiday. If the desired license was granted the trucks would carry the same type of goods but the service would be faster, and result in reduced cost for shippers and receivers.

A representative of the Charlottetown Board of Trade, Henry MacWilliams, stated that the trucks would be faster, and result in reduced cost for shippers and receivers.

Mr. Matheson also maintained that the CNR trucking firm would be unable to provide better service than the independent carriers, who were facing diminishing profits with the advent of such competition. CNR, a Crown corporation, would not have to pay taxes to the government. He also contended that the operation of CNR trucks would benefit only a limited area of the island.

The hearing was adjourned until July 10, at which time the commission will probably be heard.

He was educated at Bloomfield, Prince of Wales College and later graduated with his Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Laws degrees from the University of Toronto. He has worked with a Toronto law firm, the Toronto Industrial Commission and War-time Prices and Trade Board, before joining the company which he now heads.

Construction Of Vocational Institute To Start In August

Construction of the new Provincial Vocational Institute will begin early in August, minister of highways and public works Philip Matheson said yesterday.

The building will be built on the outskirts of Charlottetown on Malpeque Road.

Tentative completion date has been set for March 31, 1963. Estimated cost of building will be about \$1,300,000 of which 75 per cent will be paid by the Central Government.

Preliminary plans call for the calling of tenders for the foundation and steelwork at July 15. The tenders will close on July 30 and construction on this phase is to start immediately thereafter.

The tenders for the second phase, completion of the building, will be called on Sept. 15 and the steelwork at Oct. 10. It is hoped by the department that the first phase will be completed and ready for the start of the second phase as soon as the second contract is let.

Education Minister Dr. L. G. Dewar said that the contract idea is to speed up the work on the building. He said the federal government grants for vocational training schools close on March 31 and the work must be rushed for completion on that date.

Weber, Harrington and Associates, architects of the building, will with public works officials to finalize plans yesterday. They are to begin immediately to prepare tender specifications.

The building will house a vocational high school with advanced vocational training facilities for those graduating from high school as well as persons past school age who wish vocational training.

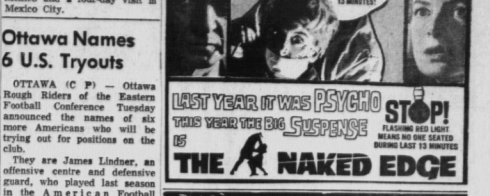
