LARCENY—James—better known as "Jemmy"—Murphy is up again for larceny. He was yesterday morning arrested on suspicion for stealing a lot of ladies' wearing apparel from the dwelling house of Mr. Lemuel Poole, on Hillsborough Street. A supposed accomplice, named Malone, was also arrested.

A beautiful new building, intended for a convent, has been erected at South Rustico, near the Chapel, during the past summer. It is about eighty feet long by forty-five feet wide; two storeys high, with French roof. The outside is finished very elaborately—the front being tastefully ornamented. Thus far it has cost in the vicinity of four thousand dollars. When completed it is expected it will have cost between ten and twelve thousand. Owing to ill health, Father McPhee, incumbent of this parish, is about leaving the Island to spend the winter in the south of France.—Patrol.

The Temperance Evangelist, Mr. D. Banks Mackenzie had quite an ovation on his arrival in North Sydney on the 9th. He was waited on by delegates from the temperance societies of the Sydney Mines, Sydney county. The shipping in port was gaily decorated with bunting, and flags flew from most of the buildings throughout the town in honor of the occasion. At a meeting the following evening over 300 persons signed the pledge. Mr. Mackenzie will return to Charlottetown on the 21st, and will visit the different towns on the Island and hold meetings.

REPORTED ASHORE.—The brig, Sarah, from New Haven, England, bound for Summerside, and owned by Mr. Amos McWilliams, of Lot 4, is reported ashore, near Sand Point, N. S.

WHERE ARE THE REMAINS OF COLUMBUS?—Prior to 1795 they were deposited in an old cathedral in St. Domingo city, but in that year, by the terms of a treaty between France and Spain, what were supposed to be the remains were transferred with great pomp to Havana. The news is now sent from St. Domingo that Spain was cheated at the time, the dust of the son of Columbus or of some other member of his family having been sent her instead of those of the great discoverer. In St. Domingo city the old tomb was opened a short time ago in the presence of the civil and ecclesiastical authorities, the casket in which, it is asserted, contains the coveted relics. The controversy on the subject is likely to be an interesting one.

THE GIRL HARNEY—FOUL PLAY SUSPECTED.—Our readers will recollect that some weeks ago a girl aged about sixteen, was discovered missing at Port Philip, N. S. An alarm was raised and parties of men searched the woods in the vicinity for some days, but finding no trace of her, the search was abandoned. About four weeks ago the body of a girl was picked up at Cape Traverse, P. E. I. An inquest was held on the remains, but no evidence being forthcoming as to their identity, the jury returned a verdict of found drowned, and the body was buried. The identity of the girl Harney, and the body found was at once surmised by the people of Port Philip, and, indeed, the suspicions of certain persons that the girl had not been fairly dealt with found currency in rumors, which resulted in Detective Hutt taking up the case. He went to P. E. Island, had the body exhumed, established by the dress, etc., to his own satisfaction that the deceased was the Port Philip girl, and then, returning to Port Philip, had Mrs. Harney, the girl's mother, and Harney, the step-father, arrested for murder. The preliminary examination of Wm. Harney and wife, charged with the murder of Mary Colburn, daughter of the latter, took place on Wednesday, before Justices Oxley, Black, Carter and Hingley, at Oxford. Twenty-six witnesses were examined, none of whose testimony in any way implicated them.—Sackville Post.

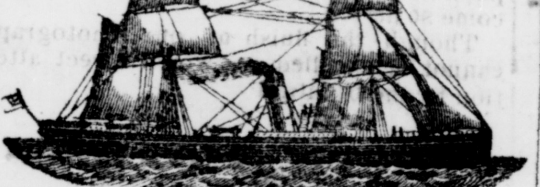
