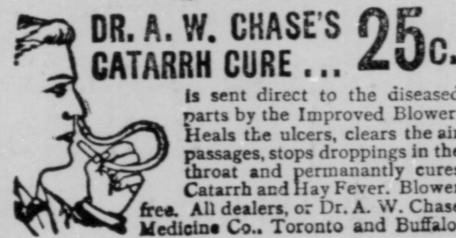

SALISBURY'S MANIFESTO.

Lord Salisbury's manifesto to the
electors of the United Kingdom, in an-
ticipation of the parliamentary general
elections, emphasizes the necessity that
that the Queen's government should
be supported by a strong parliamen-
tary majority, as the only means of con-
vincing the inhabitants of the con-
quered South African territories that
there is no hope of diverting the govern-
ment from their policy of persistent
resistance or agitation.

After remarking that "all the recent
troubles in South Africa have been due
to a shift of parliamentary opinion at
a critical moment," the prime minister
goes on to say:

"It will depend upon the disposition
and conduct of the Boers how long an
interval is to elapse before their full
position as a British colony is attained.
The brilliant success of Lord
Roberts' army must not bind us to
the imperfections disclosed in our own
defensive armor, imperfections which,
but for the war, might have been
noticed. It will be the urgent duty of
parliament and the government to re-
move these defects, a duty which cer-
tainly could not be discharged by a
ministry depending upon a broken
party."

In conclusion; Lord Salisbury refers
to China as "a difficulty among others
confronting the government and re-
quiring that the government should be
armed with a strong majority in the
house of commons." He urges that,
in view of all these considerations,
there should be no abstentions at
the polls.

A HOT DEBATE.

Mr. J. W. Sauer, former commissioner
of public works, introduced an inde-
pendent resolution in the Cape Parlia-
ment a few days ago, declaring that
the spirit of independence in the
Transvaal and Orange River colonies
might be kept down with bayonets for
a time, but it would rise again. The
peace of Africa, he further asserted,
called for the restoration of the inde-
pendence of the two republics.

Sir J. Gordon Sprigg, the Premier,
replied vigorously, advising Mr. Sauer
to address himself to Messrs. Kruger
and Steyn. In the course of his de-
bate the Premier, referring to the at-
tacks on capitalists, said that Mr. Kruger
was the greatest capitalist in the
country, and that he was not only a
capitalist but a thief. Mr. J. H.

Merriman, who was colonial treasurer
in the Schreiner Ministry, declared in
an impassioned speech that annexa-
tion would result in Great Britain
losing South Africa, and in even worse
things, for South Africa would lose
Great Britain. Several Opposition
speakers condemned the Premier's
references to Mr. Kruger. Mr. Schrei-
ner, former Premier, moved an amen-
dment to Mr. Sauer's resolution to the
effect that the two republics should be
placed under the protection of the
Queen, with a guarantee preserving
their national existence. The House
rejected the Schreiner amendment and
by a vote of 41 against 39 decided to
go into committee of supply discussing
Mr. Sauer's motion.

CHANGES IN GENERALS.

Referring to possible changes of
high army officials, Isaac N. Ford, in
his special despatch from London to
the New York Tribune says:—"Mili-
tary changes of the first importance
are predicted. The retirement of
Lord Wolseley is assumed to be in-
evitable and Lord Roberts is believed
to be certain to succeed him after he
has had a few months for restoring
his health. This arrangement will
leave the Duke of Connaught in com-
mand in Ireland and will also enable
the Government to undertake the
complex problems of military reorgan-
ization with an adviser at headquarters
who has the confidence of the country
and is the best expert respecting the
requirements of modern warfare. Lord
Kitchener and General Buller
will remain in Africa until the Govern-
ment knows what to do with them,
after conferring with Lord Roberts.
Lord Kitchener cannot be placed over
General Buller and other generals of
superior rank now in South Africa, but
Lord Salisbury has the strongest pos-
sible faith in his powers as an organ-
izer and is not likely to allow him to
be sacrificed to the prejudice and
jealousy of the Aldershot party."

JOHN BULL'S HOME FARM.

When Professor James W. Robert-
son was over in England in the sum-
mer of 1898 he gave London Chronicle
a great deal of information about Can-
ada, and that paper published a glow-
ing description of Canada's agricultura
resources, which it introduced by say-
ing: "Canada is determined to be-
come John Bull's home farm over the
water."

Canada is nearer to united Kingdom
than any other country "over the wa-
ter" and it has an advantage of thous-
ands of miles over the other colonies
excepting Newfoundland, which is des-
tined to be par: of the Dominion. With
fast Atlantic steamships running be-
tween Canadian ports and British

ports and an efficient system of cold
storage Canada would indeed become
"John Bull's home farm over the
water" and its products should certainly
have a preference in the British
market over those of the foreign farms
which now compete on equals terms.
