SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. BAD BLOOD ON BOARD SHIP.

Quarrel Between Officers and Men of the H. M. S. Royal Sovereign

PORTSMOUTH, Eng. Aug. 18.—There is great excitement here over a most extraordinary state of affairs on board the British battle ship Royal Sovereign, which is about to sail for three years service with the Mediterranean squadron. The relations between general officials and the seamen are greatly strained. The latter declare that they are suffering from a variety of very serious grievances, among which and especially objectionable is the deferring of the usual leave. Fifty men have deserted. All the cells on the ship are full, and the supply of irons is not sufficient for the large number undergoing punishment.

THE RISING IN INDIA

Swats Gathered in Force

Insurgent Tribesmen Flee.

SIMLA, Aug. 18.—A reconnaissance in the Swat Valley has discovered the enemy to be entrenched in the hills between Jalala and Landaki, confirming the reports of the gathering in force of Swats, Benedwals and Hindu fanatics.

General Blood brought his field guns into action against the stone entrenchment of the enemy, demolishing their works, whereupon the insurgents tribesmen fled.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

MADRID, Aug. 16.—Michel Angiolillo, the assassin of premier Canovas del Castillo, has been sentenced to death. Angiolillo will be garroted within the prison. Upon hearing the sentence Angiolillo turned deathly pale and had to be assisted from the court room.

BERLIN, Aug. 16.—A despatch from Dresden announces that a ferry steamer plying between the old and new towns was capsized yesterday evening by the wash of a large steamer and fifty persons were thrown into the water. Seven people are missing and it is feared the loss of life will be heavy.

CORNWALL, Aug. 16.—The employees of the Canada Colored Cotton Mills Company here have been notified that the mills will resume work on full time tomorrow. There is great rejoicing and especially among the merchants to whom the depression of trade has been a serious blow.

QUEBEC, Aug. 16.—Mr. James Robinson, the extensive wholesale boot and shoe jobber, of Montreal, has just closed one of the largest deals in his line ever transacted in this city. He has purchased the whole of the present stock of the Bresse factory. The price paid for this lot will reach in the vicinity of \$50,000. It will require a train of seven cars to ship it to Montreal.

MONTREAL, Aug. 16.—The Star's special cable from London says: Sir Louis Davies speaking today at a meeting of the Canadian section of the London chamber of commerce, said Quebec would be the summer and Halifax or St. John the winter port. The British ports would be Liverpool or Milford Haven. Among the Canadians present were General Laurier and Lt. Col. Domville.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 16.—Mr. Thomas Magee, well known as a conservative business man and a careful observer, who accompanied his son to Drea, writes to the Associated Press from that point to the effect that the ignorance displayed by the crowds who are flocking to the Klondyke fields is lamentable. Of the four hundred passengers who sailed with him on the steamer George Elder, half of whom were from San Francisco, not one in twenty had any definite knowledge as to how to reach his destination. While the routes were well known the details and conditions to be met with are not considered, most of searchers for wealth hoping to settle all doubts and uncertainties when they should reach Juneau. Instead, however, further confusion was created by the appalling statements that there were only two routes each of which necessitated the encounter of almost insurmountable difficulties. There were plenty of advocates for both routes at Juneau, but most of them were found to be interested parties. The two starting points, Dyea and Skagway, were ports of salt water. The Dyea trade goes over the Chilkoot pass and involves a climb of 3,500 feet, while the other, which is not yet completed, has a 2,350 foot climb over the White pass, and besides being six miles longer, is boggy in places. August 7 a miner was drowned about a mile and a half from Skagway.
