WINNIPEG, Oct. 18—(CP)—Coarse grain prices put on a strong display today on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange, influenced by advances on United States markets and unfavorable crop and weather news from the prairie provinces.

Aggressive buying appeared in all commodities, including shipper and American buying in oats and barley; and industrial and shipper purchases in rye and flax.

New seasonal highs were recorded in December and May oats, December, May and July barley and December and May rye.

An early carryover of offerings from yesterday dried up and the good buying came into the active market.

Export loadings of Canadian wheat included 320,000 bushels for the United Kingdom and 325,000 for the Netherlands.

Class two wheat and I.W.A. prices dropped one-quarter cent from yesterday.
