Two Maritimers Win In Sweep

QUEBEC (CP)—Two Maritimers and a resident of Quebec Saturday won more than \$75,000 in a sweepstake based on a race that was not run. Winners in the sweepstake, sponsored by the Quebec unity of the army, navy and air force veterans, were Arthur Stuart of Hall Harbor, Kings county, N. S.; M. F. Keady, Halifax; and Edmond Chalfour, Beauport, Que. Stuart won \$39,407, Keady took second prize money of \$23,644, Chalfour won \$15,762.

The sweepstake was to have been based on the Manchester handicap, scheduled for Saturday in Manchester, Eng. when the race was cancelled Friday because of continued rain, the veterans' association called a hurried meeting of directors. They decided at a meeting Saturday to place numbers from one to 43 in a special drawing. They, in the presence of the directors, and several representatives of the press, three numbers were drawn. These were then compared with the order in which that number of horses was originally drawn. The first number drawn was declared winner of the first prize.

Under the sweepstake plan, \$23,600 had been assigned for holders of tickets on horses finishing out of the money, and another \$23,000 was earmarked for holders of tickets on horses scratched before post time.

This was lumped into a total of \$46,000 and will be divided among the remaining 40 Canadians whose tickets were drawn last week. Another amount of \$23,000 will be distributed, as originally planned, in 100 consolation prizes.

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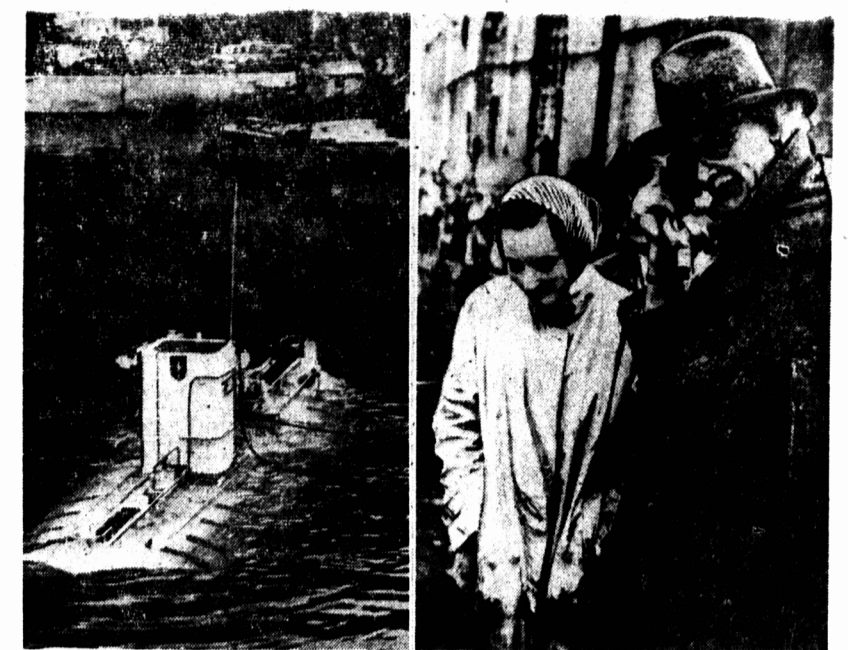
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Prepare To Break Their Own Diving Record

Week-end N.H.L. Games

TORONTO (CP)—Left-winger Sid Smith was the payoff man for the second time in as many games Saturday night as Toronto Maple Leafs shut out Detroit Red Wings here before 13,659 fans.

The victory extended the Maple Leafs' unbeaten streak to seven games and lifted them into second place in the National Hockey League standings by a single point over the Red Wings. The game was almost a carbon copy of Thursday night's contest between the clubs in Detroit. Toronto took a 1-0 decision in the one-with-crow-out Smith firing the only goal.

Red Wing captain Ted Lindsay continued his feuding with the fans Saturday night by swinging his stick at a fan who was heckling him just before the game ended. Thursday in Detroit he had scrambled over the boards after a heckler.

Smith's goal came at the 42-second mark of the third period during a power play while Detroit's Tony Leswick was serving time.

MONTREAL (CP)—Bernie Boom-Boom Geoffrion, blasting home a 10-foot shot for his 15th goal of the National Hockey season, maintained his goal-a-game average Saturday night in Montreal's Canadiens 2-1 victory over Boston Bruins.

The deciding goal in the close-checking, all-out tussle went to Calum Baldy MacKay in the third period, nine minutes before Real Chevrefils potted Boston's lone tally with less than four minutes to play. Both Montreal goals came while Boston was short-handed.

Goalie Claude Evans, taking over in the Montreal nets for the injured Jacques Plante, was a big factor in keeping Canadiens at the top of the NHL standing although he had only 24 shots to handle against 33 poured at him by Boston. Evans, given a big hand by the crowd of 14,409, came up to Can-

adiens from Montreal Royals of the Quebec Hockey League.

Jonquiere Team Quits The QJHL

MONTREAL (CP)—The Jonquiere Marquis, plagued this season with player and coaching troubles, have decided to withdraw from the Quebec Junior Hockey League.

The announcement was made at a QJHL meeting here Saturday, and officials immediately began drafting a temporary playing schedule for the three remaining league teams.

A committee, set up to study the possibility of taking a replacement fourth club into the league, is to report early this week but recruiting of another club at this time was believed unlikely.

Frank Dilio, registrar of the Quebec Amateur Hockey Association, said all Jonquiere players will remain property of the QJHL until a final decision is made on the league's operation.

It is believed however the players will be absorbed by the remaining QJHL clubs—Quebec Frontenacs, Trois-Rivieres Flambeaux and Montreal Junior Canadiens.

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Edmonton Eskimos Win Way To Grey Cup Finals

EDMONTON (CP)—For the second time in three years Grey Cup fever is epidemic in Edmonton. And football fans today are singing the praises of Edmonton Eskimos who wrapped up the Western Interprovincial Union football title with a 10-5 victory over Winnipeg Blue Bombers Saturday night. Esks won their last title in 1952.

The happy elation was in sharp contrast to the cloud of pessimism that pervaded the city after Esks stunning 12-6 loss to the Bombers on Thursday in Winnipeg. Edmonton chances were not rated very high after that although they had taken the first game 9-3 last Saturday.

Eskimos, took advantage of a suddenly porous Winnipeg line to grind out 242 yards while holding bombers to 59 on the ground. The same Winnipeg line had been a reformed brick wall in the Thursday contest.

About 19,000 fans who shivered in 18-degree weather saw Bombers halted in their tracks. All their points came via the booting method—a field goal and two singles.

Jackie Parker, capped a 78-yard Edmonton drive, for the game's only touchdown from the five-yard line in the second quarter.

Bill Rogers booted the conversion and then kicked a fourth quarter field goal. Bernie Faloney kicked a first-quarter single.

Edmonton now meet Kitchener Waterloo Dutchmen in the Grey Cup sudden-death semi-final here Saturday in one of the sport oddest of the year. Kitchener-Waterloo is the Edmonton farm club. The Dutchmen won the Ontario Rugby Football Union title last week.

The winners advance to the Grey Cup final in Toronto Nov. 27 against either Montreal Alouettes or Hamilton Tiger-Cats. These two clubs begin their two-game total-point Big Four series on Wednesday.

Earlier Saturday, police here disclosed they had made one of the largest narcotics seizures in Canadian history when they found 25 ounces of pure heroin in a safety deposit box rented by Brent.

The cache was worth an estimated \$175,000 on the underworld market.

LONDON (AP)—Air Commodore Wallace Hart Hyle 44, Australian-born aide-de-camp to Queen Elizabeth, Sunday was named commander of the RAF in Malaya. He will take over his new duties in February, with the rank of acting air vice-marshal, replacing Air Vice Marshal P. R. W. Scherger.

Strike Threatens Ford In Toronto

TORONTO (CP)—Members of the United Automobile Workers Union (CIO-CCL) voted Sunday to strike at the suburban parts depot of the Ford Motor Company of Canada in suburban Etobicoke.

The wage walkout, planned for 7 a.m. EST today, involves 133 men and would close the company's third and last production plant in the country. A total of 5,700 workers struck at Ford's big plant in Windsor early last month and 800 assembly workers quit work at Oakville, midway between Toronto and Hamilton, a week later.

All are asking for wage boosts and other benefits.

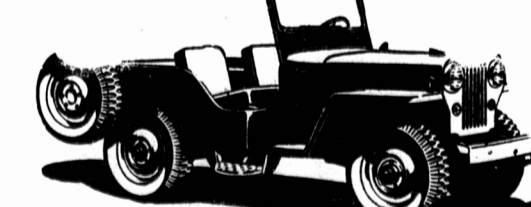
