(Continued from page 1) on products, it said the goods likely covered a wide range.

"The expansion of imports stimulated by continuing high economic activity in Canada and in the United States, with a wide spectrum of commodities, with machinery, automobile parts and other industrial materials again contributing substantially to the overall increase."

The report noted the average prices of Canadian goods being exported did not increase much in the first half of this year over the last two years. Prices were higher than last year. But the prices of imports were "considerably" higher than last year.

So far as this merchandise trade is concerned, Canada's deficit position is due only to a few commodities, notably the United States. While the trading surplus shows overseas countries more than made up the deficit with the U.S. in increased to \$1,070,000,000 from \$989,000,000.

URGES ACTION ON Planned Construction

Those planning sizable 1967 construction projects involving construction activities should decide on them as soon as possible, the president of the Canadian Construction Association, Donald H. Zupp, told delegates at the association's annual convention yesterday.

He said the construction industry was able to handle a number of projects without strain on the go ahead signal was given, the preliminary preparations often took so long as, if not longer than, the actual construction.
