

Flyers Trounce Aces 9-2

6 Majors, 4 Misconducts In Wild And Woolly 3rd Period

Parkdale Flyers assured themselves of at least a tie for the Island Hockey League title at the Sports Arena last night by demolishing Summerside Aces 9-2 in a game that blew wide open in the third period and turned into a riot.

The Flyers sailed through the short-handed Aces without a great deal of trouble after overcoming the Aces 2-1 lead at the end of the first period. The winners rammed home 5 goals in the second and added three more in the third before tempers which seemed to be at the breaking point all evening, flared and turned the game into a riot.

Referee Leith Jay and Joe Revell earned their night's wages as they broke up four fights and handed out 6 major penalties and 4 misconducts, all coming in the last half of the final period.

LIGHT FUSE

Skip Carver and Garth Harris lit the fuse that caused the explosion at 10:08 of the third period when they clashed along the sideboards. Gloves and sticks were dropped and the two went at it. After a few minutes order was more or less restored, but the worst was yet to come. Vance Harris had some words with the officials as they were assessing major penalties to Garth Harris and Carver and for his trouble received a 10-minute misconduct and joined his teammate and Carver in the box.

They were just getting settled down when 2 minutes later Orin Carver and Gord Cutcliffe began to mix it up near the Summerside bench. They went at it hot and heavy and while the referees were busy trying to separate them Skip Carver hopped out of the penalty box and began to trade some more punches with the Harris boys.

Fans swarmed on the ice and Ralph Josey got into the act by throwing a punch at Cutcliffe. After the smoke was cleared, Skip Carver received an additional misconduct; Orin Carver and Cutcliffe were each tagged with majors and misconducts and Josey got a minor.

For most teams this would have been enough roughhousing for one night but in the final minute of play Ron MacArthur jammed Erland Wood in on the boards and Wood came off swinging. Both got majors.

ORIN NETS

Before all of this started the Flyers were handing the Aces a hard booting. Before he left the game in the third Orin Carver fired three of the Parkdale goals. Willie Dunn sniped two and single went to Allie Carver, Junior and Jim MacLeod and Skip Carver.

Vance Harris and Ulric Gallant scored both Summerside tallies to give the Aces a shortlived 2-1 lead in the first.

The Flyers really rolled in the second period firing home 5 straight goals. Orin Carver got two of them and Allie Jim MacLeod and Dunn the others.

Willie Dunn scored a beautiful goal for Parkdale at the 8 minute mark after swiping the puck from Eustace Reeves like a burglar in the night. Reeves had the puck near his own net. Willie swiped it off his stick, knocking him down in the process; then deked his way around Ron MacArthur and outguessed Mann for an unassisted effort.

Junior MacLeod made it 8-2 on a wicked drive from just inside the blue line and skip Carver rapped in the 9th goal 8 seconds before he and Garth Harris mixed it up.

Teams from Alberton, Summerside, Montague and Charlottetown begin play this morning in the double round robin series and competition will conclude Thursday night.

The foursome taking top honors travels to Winnipeg later in the month to compete for the Dominion title.

DEFENDING CHAMPS

Summerside rink is the defending Island champion and will be led into play today by skip Arthur Morrison, the only holdover from last year's champs. Last year Morrison was second stone for his squad. Newcomers to the team are Ned Henthorn as mate, Robert Holman as second stone and Phil Lip MacDonald with the lead stone.

The Charlottetown P.W.C. entry is skipped by Arthur Burke. Arnold Llewellyn is mate; Allison Saunders, second stone and Harris Dingwell is the lead.

Rev MacLeod will direct the play of the Montague quartet. Kenny MacKenzie is mate with Billy Crawford as second stone and Paul Desroches first stone. The Montague team will carry a spare, Erroll MacLure.

FIRST TIME

David Campbell will have the honor of shipping the first Alberton rink ever to compete in the schoolboy playdowns. Clair Oliver is the mate on the team with Hilton Barbour Jr. as second stone and Edward McAlduff is the lead. When this foursome takes to the ice they will be writing the first chapter of schoolboy curling history for the Alberton club.

All matches will be 10 ends and the draw will be made this morning with the first matches getting underway at 10 o'clock. Other matches will be played this afternoon at 2 p.m. and this evening at 6.45. Play will resume again Thursday morning and continue through afternoon and evening when the winning team will be crowned.

A.B. Bagnall is the umpire of the matches.

Schoolboy curling, both on a National and Provincial basis, is being sponsored this year by the Pepsi-Cola Company. This company has donated challenge trophies for Provincial competition and will fly the winning rink of each Province to the finals in Winnipeg.

Duel Between Sask. & Quebec Rinks For A Major Trophy

QUEBEC (CP)—The fight for one of the major trophies in the 44th Quebec international bonspiel is shaping up as a duel between a powerful local rink and the Campbell brothers quartet from Avonlea, Sask.

A. F. Muth's Quebec Victoria rink round to its third consecutive win Tuesday, downing Jack Tolton's Toronto Granite team 8-3 in competition for the Chateau Trophy. Garnet Campbell's rink, also playing in the Chateau competition, defeated R. LaHie's Cap-de-la-Madeleine, Que., team 13-9 in a third-round game.

Both clubs now enter the quarter-finals. According to the draw they will meet in the finals if they both win the next two games.

IMPRESSIVE RECORDS

The Campbells, rated as one of the continent's top curling units, won the Canadian curling championship in 1955. The Muth team last year won the Lieutenant-Governor's and Grand Aggregate Cup in the Quebec bonspiel.

Nazaire Lemelin's Quebec Etchemin rink, winners of the Chateau Trophy in 1955 and the Omega Trophy in 1956, won its third-round match in the Chateau competition Tuesday, crushing G. Cameron's East Malartic, Que., 10-5.

Gaston Amyot's Quebec Jacques Cartier rink, winners in 1955 of the Lieutenant-Governor's trophy, entered the quarter-finals in the Omega Trophy competition by edging 7-6 another Jacques Cartier team skipped by his brother Pierre.

More than 500 curlers from 124 Canadian and United States teams are competing for 15 trophies in the week-long bonspiel. Teams are entered from six provinces and several United States cities.

Half the clubs are drawn for competition in the Chateau and the other half for the Omega Trophy. First-round losers in either of these events drop to competition for the Francois Jobin Gold Cup.

PLAY ON 18 RINKS

Rinks reaching the quarter-finals in any of these events are eligible to compete for the Lieutenant-Governor's Trophy, emblematic of the international championship. The team winning most games in the Omega, Chateau, Jobin and Lieutenant-Governor's events is awarded the grand aggregate bowl.

N.H.L. Owners Will Not Send Teams On Tour of Europe

PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP)—National Hockey League owners Tuesday rejected a proposal to send teams to Europe on an exhibition tour at the end of the season.

The owners, at their annual mid-winter meeting at the Palm Beach Biltmore Hotel, reported hockey is spreading in popularity.

"It's creeping into the middle states," said league president Clarence Campbell of Montreal. "They have a big arena at Charlotte, N.C., and we're hopeful that Norfolk gets into the fold soon."

Campbell said televising of games in the United States was discussed at the meeting and all owners present are "thrilled and enthusiastic" over the developments.

He reported that only minor technical changes were made in some of the league's by-laws and that no important business came up.

Three More Leafs Added To Long List of Injuries

TORONTO (CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs, hounded by injuries throughout most of the National Hockey League season to date, Tuesday added three new names to the medical-treatment list.

Centre Rudy Migay, with a swollen ankle suffered Sunday, and defenceman Ron Stewart, suffering infection, are in hospital. Migay is expected to play tonight against Montreal Canadiens here, but Stewart may miss the game, team officials said.

Right wing Tod Sloan, who returned last weekend after a shoulder dislocation kept him idle for a month, is bothered by the same shoulder and is to undergo a check-up.

LEADS RATINGS

Bruins' Goalie Tops In League

TORONTO (CP)—When Boston Bruins lost Terry Sawchuk, they faced one of their darkest hours. But Don Simmons, his replacement, is the hottest goaltender in the National Hockey League.

Simmons had by far the best showing last week in the efficiency ratings of the NHL netminders. The 25-year-old rookie stopped 3 of 5 shots for a .973 "holding average."

That raised his percentage for the five games in which he has played for Bruins 42 points to 336. That's the best mark in the league but he doesn't qualify for top billing since the other goalkeepers have played most of the season to date.

Glenn Hall of Detroit Red Wings managed to hold the one-point lead at the top of the standings over Montreal's Jacques Plante.

Hall had one of his poorest weeks of the season, giving up 11 goals in 8 shots for a .84 average, which lowered his season's mark four points to .928.

Plante was a little more stingy than Hall but also had a rough time. He stopped 60 of 68 shots, a .822 record, which gave him .927 on the season.

Sawchuk's season's record of .921 is still the third best in the league. Ed Chadwick of Toronto Maple Leafs regained fourth place from New York Rangers' Lorne Worsley.

Chadwick stopped 52 of 60 shots for a .86 average during the week, giving him .909 for the season, compared with Worsley's .908. The Ranger goalkeeper was beaten 15 times out of 104 shots for a week's total of .856, the worst turned in by a regular player this season.

Al Rollins of Chicago had the closest record to Simmons during the week. Big Al turned aside 126 of the 136 shots fired his way for a .926 percentage, which raised his last-place showing two points to .903.

LOOKING FOR SEVENTH TITLE

Stan Musial's bat will be booming again for the St. Louis Cardinals following the signing of his 1957 contract for a reported \$80,000 in St. Louis. The salary figure — which is the highest in the National League — was the same Stan was paid last year, although his batting average dropped nine points to .310 in the 1956 season. The 32-year-old first baseman,



who is beginning his 18th year in professional baseball, set a new N.L. record of 1,086 extra base hits last year. He has a total of 2,781 hits tallied over his major league career and is moving toward the 3,000 goal reached by only seven players. He will also be seeking his seventh National league batting title.
