CLEVELAND, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Lester Felton of Detroit tonight scored a technical knockout over Paul Flanagan of St. Paul at the end of the third round of a scheduled 10-rounder when the Minnesota boxer suffered an injury to his right arm.

Referee Jackie Davis said the St. Paul welterweight suffered an injury to his right elbow in the first round. Dr. M.F. Bright, who examined the arm twice, said it apparently was a torn ligament or a nerve injury.

Flanagan, who gained a split decision over Felton in Chicago last year, weighed 147 to 151 for his opponent.

The fight had hardly opened before Flanagan winced and grasped his right arm. From then on he appeared to be in deep pain each time.

Flanagan was unable to appear for the fourth round, the bout will be recorded as a fourth-round technical knockout.

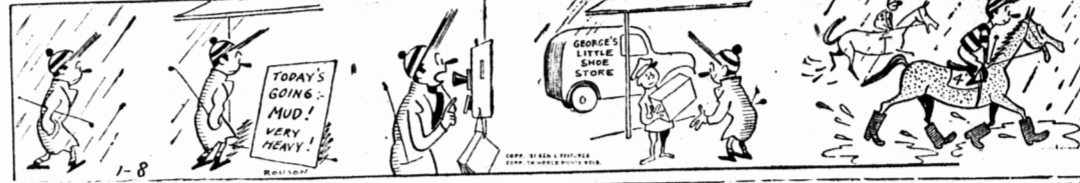

The usually quiet Dugger McNeil, of the Halifax Atlantic, is learning that there is more to being a hockey coach than merely guiding his players. To be classed as a colorful, aggressive coach one must learn to say as much as possible about nothing and try to make it mean something. According to one keen observer, fan this is what McNeil has done as he came out of his shell in Halifax to toss an egg at the Charlottetown fans.

McNeil is quoted by a Halifax sports columnist as saying "Last time we were in Charlottetown, we were showered with potatoes and eggs. And mind you the eggs were fresh. McNeil goes on to say that the married men of his club will erect a wire and collect the eggs in order to betray the grocery bill. A fan, who sits behind the Halifax bench phoned this department last night to say that such charges were not true. For our part we have not seen any raw eggs or potatoes at the Halifax plays this season.

Islanders coach Murphy Chamberlain could not be contacted last night but according to reports he is contemplating trading half his defense for centreman George Robertson of Sydney. The proposed deal is that the Islanders trade George McLagan and Orval Lavell for the Sydney centreman, who started the season with a burst and has slowed to a walk in recent games. In the event of such a trade Chamberlain could move Bob Gray or Lyle Wiseman back on defense and recall Len Holey from Saint John. Or he may have another defenseman in line.

Sydney of course would be very reluctant about giving up Robertson. He is their number one centreman, has carried much of their offensive strength throughout the season. From here, however, he looks to be going over the hill. In recent games, maybe due to overwork, he has not looked as effective as he did earlier in the year. During the past three weeks or month he has advanced very little in the scoring race. A change of scenery and two good wingers could bring him back to form.

The acquisition of Ted Powers by the Islanders may shelve all thoughts of such a deal. Powers is a 21-year-old centreman, who has been playing in Vancouver since he was traded to the Islanders by the Canadiens this season and he was obtained by the Islanders yesterday. Last year he played with New Haven in the Eastern Amateur League. Chuck Holdaway played with Powers in Vancouver this year and he says Powers is a smart pivotman. Ted did not figure too prominently in the scoring summaries of the Western Hockey League but neither did Len Holey or Jim Anderson who starred with Glace Bay last season.

Johnny Morrow, ex-Islanders and ex-Halifax Saint Mary's has been placed on the M.M.H.L. waiver list by the Sydney Millionaires. When Sydney played here Monday it was evident that Morrow had come near the end of the trail with the Millionaires. He was used very sparingly during the third period and in the over-time was not used at all. He will probably finish the year in the Quebec Provincial League.

Kid Gavilan To Defend Title In Feb.

CHICAGO, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Kid Gavilan of Cuba will defend his welterweight title against undefeated Chuck Davey in Detroit in a 15-round bout Feb. 11 at Chicago Stadium, the International Boxing Club announced today.

Davey, former national boxing champion at Michigan State College, is unbeaten in 38 professional bouts. This week he was ranked third, behind Johnny Saxton and Johnny Bratton, as a contender for Gavilan's crown.

James D. Norris, IBC president, announcing the bout at a news conference, said Gavilan will receive 40 per cent of the net gate with 20 per cent going to Davey.

Halifax Curling Rinks Winners

HALIFAX, Jan. 7.—(CP)—Mayflower and Halifax curling rinks were winners of matches played with Amherst and Kentville clubs today.

The Mayflower Club made its fifth successful defence of the McLellan Challenge Cup, emblematic of Maritime curling supremacy, defeating four rinks from the Amherst Club 95-45.

Halifax curlers defeated the Gloucester Curling Club of Kentville 48-26 in their first defence of the Tip Top Trophy for play among Juniors of the Halifax, Dartmouth, Valley and South Shore clubs.

Black Hawks Take Over Second Place With 6-4 Victory Over N.Y. Rangers

NEW YORK, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Chicago Black Hawks took over second place in the National Hockey League race tonight by beating the tail-end New York Rangers 6-4 on the strength of a four-goal second-period barrage.

Until tonight's win, Chicago had been tied with Montreal Canadiens for the runner-up position. The Canadiens, along with the remainder of the league, were idle tonight.

The Rangers took a 2-1 lead in the first period, but wilted in the second. Gus Bodnar tied the score 42 seconds after the second period opened. Less than a minute later, Wally Hergeshelmer skated nearly the length of the ice and netted his 18th goal unassisted.

Bill Mosenko tied it 3:31 19 seconds later and the Hawks were in front to stay when Fred Hucel scored with Dean Prentice of the Rangers serving a penalty.

With less than three minutes of play remaining in the second period, Chicago defenceman Cal Gardner sewed it up with a goal from close in.

The Rangers scored a fluke one early in the final session when Paul Ronny passed out from behind the net. The puck struck Chicago defenceman Leo Fogolin's skate and glanced into the net.

With 33 seconds to go, coach Bill Cook of the Rangers pulled out his goalie and threw six attackers on the ice. The move back-fired. Allan Stanley missed a pass. Fogolin picked it up and passed to Bodnar, who shot the puck into the empty net.

The first period scoring came in the opening four minutes. Jimmy Peters scored for Chicago and Nick Mickoski and rookie Aggie Kukulowick scored for the Rangers. Kukulowick and Michael Labadie, both forwards, got their first taste of the big time in tonight's game. Both joined the Rangers on trial this week from Quebec Citadels of the Quebec Junior League.

CHICAGO, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Youth just isn't having its fling any more and it's hurting baseball attendance—the effects of T.V. on the national pastime, has pored over population and survey figures to prepare a report on the subject.

NEW YORK, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Hoyt Wilhelm, brilliant relief pitcher, has signed the first New York Giant pitcher to sign his 1953 contract. No figures were announced but it represented a "substantial increase" over his rookie pay, perhaps about \$12,800. The right-hander had sensational freshman season, leading the National League in win and lost percentage with a 15-3 record and earned run average with 2.43—the first rookie ever to win both honors.

Would Take Time To Re-establish Credit of C.P.R.

OTTAWA, Jan. 7.—(CP)—It would take from three to five years to re-establish the credit of the Canadian Pacific Railway under a proposed new system of allowing freight rates, a financial witness told the Board of Transport Commissioners today.

S. E. Nixon, Montreal investment banker, was testifying for the company in its application to have the board set up the new method that would allow it substantially higher freight rates.

Mr. Nixon and other CPR witnesses had testified earlier that the CPR lacks "investor confidence" needed to enable to finance adequately. This claim is disputed by eight Provincial Governments, all except Ontario and Quebec.

Mr. Nixon expressed the view today that a general declaration by the board saying the company was entitled to a "fair" rate of return would have "a very strong beneficial effect on investor confidence."

The goal of a fair yield, he said, should be brought about in stages as circumstances permit. The first move should be to adjust the company's charges to its users.

Jockey Despirito Confirms Age

LAWRENCE, Mass., Jan. 7.—(AP)—Tony Despirito, champion jockey, left Lawrence today for Tropical Park, Fla. to resume riding, but not before he cleared up a question of his age.

Despirito said he is only 17 years old. In fact, he became 17 last Dec. 24 which means most of 390 wins in 1952 were piled up while he was only 16. Lawrence City Hall records confirmed this.
