Boston papers to the 5th inst. have been received since our last. The trial of Mr. M'Leod had been deferred until the 11th inst. in consequence of the non-arrival of witnesses from Canada.

HALIFAX, Oct. 13.—We have not seen such a number of ships of war in this harbour for a number of months, as there are at present. Besides the Winchester, bearing the flag of Admiral Adam, the frigates Seringapatam, Crocodile, Cleopatra, and Pique, and the brigs Victor, Racer, and brigantine Charybdis, have lately arrived, and it is currently reported that they will all remain in this harbour, under the immediate direction of the Admiral, until the issue of Mr. M'Leod's trial is ascertained.

NEW BRUNSWICK.—The Rev. Mr. Temple is at present engaged in obtaining the means for providing the necessary library, apparatus and furniture for the Wesleyan Academy at Sackville, which has been erected by Charles F. Allison, Esq. at an expense of £4000; intended as a seminary in which a sound religious education may be obtained, by the Wesleyans and their friends in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

Eighteen of the guns of the Malabar have been raised and forwarded to Halifax, and the remainder, it is probable, will be raised during the next summer.—Picton, Mechanic & Farmer.

It is understood that our new Governor, Capt. Huntly, will not leave England until the 19th of the present month. Captain Huntly transacted business with Lord Stanley, at the Colonial Office, on the 9th September.

Ten Rams of the new, or improved Leicester breed, were shipped at London, by order of the Central Agricultural Society, on board of the Lady Wood, which arrived here on Thursday last. One of them unfortunately died on the passage; the remainder were landed in good condition. Part of them are to be disposed of by auction on the 30th inst. See Adv.

The Supreme Court for Prince County opened at St. Eleazer's on Tuesday the 5th inst.—the two first days were occupied in Motions and Appeals—on Thursday Thomas Large (against whom a Bill had been found the previous Session) was tried for Larceny—Not Guilty. W. Scherman, Esq. and Thomas Milligan and Nathaniel Milligan, Constables, were indicted for an Assault upon Mr. James E. S. Baghall—not guilty. On Friday, a cause in Ejectment, Clark vs. Newsome, came on for trial—non-suit—and Saturday a case of trespass, John Cook vs. Moys—verdict for defendant. The Court rose at a late hour on Saturday evening.—Gaz.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE COLONIAL HERALD.

Sir: Will you have the kindness to insert this, in answer to a communication signed Re-Echo, which appeared in the last Royal Gazette.

Yours truly, QUID-PRO-QUO.

TO RE-ECHO:

You are pleased, Mr. Re-Echo, to be facetious in your letter, and assume a figurative mode of showing to the world your utter contempt of a letter signed Echo. In so doing, why not choose a less vulgar allegory than a cur and a Newfoundland dog? Your temper must have misled you sadly, to have supposed Echo to be a cur, whatever your judgment might have done in personating the late Governor as a Newfoundland dog, the best specimen of which could only be looked upon as a good natured animal.

You accuse Echo of want of courage in not publishing his letter antecedent to the departure of Sir C. A. Fitz Roy. You, Sir, on the contrary, have shown a considerable degree of courage in sending forth so unceremonious an epistle as yours was to the public. Do you not know the old adage, "that a bad advocate is worse than none, for that such a one will most probably both injure his cause and make himself ridiculous." I fear lest this will be your case.

With an unpardonable inconsistency, you then proceed, by acknowledging you have been told by the Editor, that it was from the circumstance of its having arrived too late for insertion that Echo did not appear previous to the Governor's departure. Still, Sir, without any good foundation, but from mere possibility, you take upon yourself to contradict a statement which has been made by one who must have been better informed upon this subject than you possibly could have been. I can only attribute such an argument to a prejudiced ignorance; I have too much charity to attribute it to a wilful misrepresentation, which, should such be the case, an inference could be drawn which would redound any thing but credit upon the signature Re-Echo.

I cannot help acknowledging that I agree with the sentiments of Echo's letter, and in my own mind can attribute no absolute necessity for its appearance, at the critical time to which you lay so much importance; it was not a personal attack upon his Excellency; so much notice would not have been taken of him; his name was merely quoted as being the channel, (and not the source,) through which certain measures came; the measures of a corrupt government, and not the man who represented that government, were the subjects to be discussed. Echo has made certain accusations, as you, Re-Echo, term them, which the just convictions of many must know to be well founded. It was not the part of the Governor to refute these, even had he been able; his adviser or advisers were the persons to have answered them; they were and are the responsible persons.

I must now apologise to the readers of this for having so far condescended to an altercation with you in the public papers; and recommend, should you again appear in the columns of a newspaper, that your conclusions should be drawn from facts, founded upon good evidence, and not merely upon possibility; otherwise not only will your argument, but perhaps your character, be proved to be something false.

DIED.

Near the mouth of the Columbia River, on the 8th of January last, Samuel Black, Esquire, a chief factor in the Hudson Bay Company. The deceased was shot by an Indian of one of the tribes inhabiting that country, as an atonement, it is supposed, for the death of a chief, who fell a victim to a disease which baffled the skill of their "medicine men," and was consequently ascribed by them to the "evil spirit of the whites." Mr. Black went to the Indian country in 1802, in the service of Sir Alexander M'Kenzie & Co. and joined the North West Company's service at the coalition of 1805. He was an active and intelligent man; and was on the eve of retiring from the Indian country, when the savage and unprovoked attack which caused his death was committed.
