Two Czechs Working For U. S. Sentenced

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia, April 17 — (Reuters) — two Czech translators of the United States Information Service given stiff prison sentences today on charges of espionage, spreading hostile propaganda and supplying state secrets to the chief of the Press Department of the U. S. Embassy.

Lubos Eisner was sentenced to 18 years and Miss Dagmar Kacerovska to 15 years. Their property was ordered confiscated.
