Color in Accent In Spring Style

NEW YORK, April 7—(C.P.)—Easter fashions, mingling ideas from New York and Paris designers, stress color accent as the spice of the 1936 recipe for spring chic.

When smart Americana appears in Easter parades from Fifth Avenue to Michigan Boulevard, the sober costume hues will be lightened by some of the most striking and colorful accessories the fashion world has launched in years.

Rustling taffeta petticoats, suede and felt gloves and gay flower accents at waistlines and throats will add the same vivid touches as bright hued threads running across the background of a dark tapestry.

So important are the accessories that fashionable femininity must count its colors carefully to avoid the pitfalls of too many and too bright hues.

Discreet black and navy blue are the favorite costume colors, but they are given new life by such accents as sulphur yellow, coral, Kelly green and hyacinth. A new plum red and a new "hellum" white (the color of a balloon bag) are chic touches for grey and black. Beige and brown have been thrust into the background.

Suits ranging all the way from mannish tailcoats to ensembles combining a slim frock with a short swagger coat or cape, will be in high favor with smart women on Easter morning.

Easter bonnets, stamped with the mark of 1936, will complete the costumes. Small sailers rimmed with veils, dark togues touched with bright flower clusters, Chinese mandarin hats and wide-brimmed flat-crowned straws will all be in evidence.

King Edward Will Distribute Money In 600-Year-Old "Maundy" Ceremony

Only One Other King Has Performed Rite in Last 200 Years



The faces of these old people shine with joy as they receive "maundy money" from the King. King Edward will personally perform this ceremony on April 8, the second time the British monarch has acted in the last 200 years.

LONDON, April 7—King Edward VIII will revive an age old custom on April 9 when he personally distributes alms to poor men and women in Westminster Abbey, as part of the ceremony which has taken place on Maundy Thursday every year for the last 600 years.

King Edward is the second monarch to have attended the ceremony in the last 200 years. The first was King George V, who attended with Queen Mary in 1932. On other occasions the King has appointed special officials to carry out the rite.

Happy and with smiles wreathing their features 42 poor aged men and 42 women receive a silver "Maundy penny" from the King in addition to 50 shillings for the

men and 35 shillings for the women in lieu of clothing. Orders were given the royal mint some time ago to strike the special coin which the King will give away.

The number of persons to whom the coin is given is fixed by the age of the ruling monarch. While King Edward is only 41 he decided to make the presentation to 42 men and women, as his birthday on June 23 is so near.

The King also gave special grants to 58 others who would have received it this year had not King George died.

King being then in his 48th year, there was distributed at the Banqueting House, Whitehall, to 48 poor men and 48 poor women, bollen beef and shoulders of mutton, together with small bowls of ale, which is called dinner. After that, large wooden platters of fish and loaves, viz., undressed, one large ling and one dried cod, 12 red herrings, 12 white herrings, and four half-quarter loaves. Each person had one platter of this provision, after which was distributed to them shoes, stockings, linen and woollen cloth, and leather bags, together with one penny, twopenny, threepenny and fourpenny pieces of silver, as well as shillings, making a total of about four pounds in value received by each. His grace the lord archbishop of York, lord high almoner, performed the annual ceremony of washing the feet of the poor in the royal chapel, Whitehall, as was formerly done by the kings themselves."

Later during the reign of George III, the ceremony changed still more. It was in 1814 that the Yeomen of the Guard entered the chapel carrying a large gold dish containing 150 bags, in each of which were 75 pennies. The grants, however, were not distributed until the close of the evening church service.

During succeeding years the royal alms have been dispensed in money, and the payment in fish, meat and the washing of the feet abandoned. Maundy money is greatly prized and is seldom spent, rather it is handed down from one generation to another as heirlooms.

Countess Helps Harvard Pi Eta

BOSTON, April 7—(C.P.)—Snubbed by college girls but honored by a countess.

That was the record of Harvard's Pi Eta Club boys when they revealed the Countess of Ashburnham of Fredericton N. B., had smiled upon their efforts to produce the greatest show in Harvard history and had consented to head the list of patronesses.

The Cambridge thespians received smarting rebuffs from Vassar, from Smith, from Bryn Mawr, and even from Sarah Lawrence, when they sought undergraduates from these institutions to be chorus girls in the production.

How the Pi Etas ever hit upon the English aristocracy as potential moral support for their efforts was a matter of mystery at Harvard but Andrew Hutchinson, manager of the show, proudly exhibited a letter from the Countess's secretary. It says in part: "The Right Honorable, the Countess of Ashburnham, received an invitation yesterday requesting the honor of her name to be used as a patroness for the annual Pi Eta theatricals. Her Ladyship is very glad to be able to grant the request of the committee."

"Her Ladyship, not being acquainted with any of the students, wondered as to how you got her name," the message continued. "I am sure her Ladyship will do all she can to help along any good cause. - - - Wishing you young people every success in your undertaking."

Ascertaining this was the first time in history a Harvard venture has been given such patronage, Hutchinson said it was not certain that the Countess would attend the performance of the club, but that if she did, every effort would be made to give her a royal welcome.

SPECIMENS ADDED TO N. S. MUSEUM

HALIFAX, April 7—(C.P.)—Stone instruments used in Nova Scotia probably prior to the coming of the Algonquin Indians, when the Eskimos were the principal and only residents of this part of the world, arrowheads, old but interesting clothes, pictures, household utensils, birds, fish—and hundreds of other things were added to the provincial museum during 1935, according to the report submitted to the Nova Scotia legislature by curator Harry Piers of Halifax.

In all, 137 specimens are recorded in the books of the institution and there is a total of 35,000 exhibits on display at present.

The report indicated more interest was being exhibited in the museum, 10,234 persons visiting the institution in 1935, an increase over the previous year.
