R. A. J. Phillips, Chief of the Arctic Division, Department of Northern Affairs, will address the Canadian Club at their dinner meeting on Monday, May 27th at the Charlottetown Hotel. Mr. Phillips was born in Toronto and after graduating from the University of Toronto joined the Canadian Club at their dinner service in the United Kingdom and northwest Europe in the Artillery and Intelligence, he joined the Department of External Affairs in September, 1945.

Mr. Phillips was appointed to the Canadian Embassy in Moscow where he remained from January, 1947 until May, 1949. He was then appointed to the National Defence College in Kingston. On returning to Ottawa he served as Canadian Secretary of the Permanent Joint Board on Defence for the following two years. In August, 1952, he was seconded to the Privy Council Office where he served as Secretary of the Cabinet Defence Committee.

In March and April of 1955 Mr. Phillips was on an inspection tour of the Central Arctic, and in the summer of 1956 was Officer-in-Charge of Eastern Arctic Patrol. Since 1950 Mr. Phillips has lectured at Carleton College in Political Science (The Theory and Practice of the Soviet State). 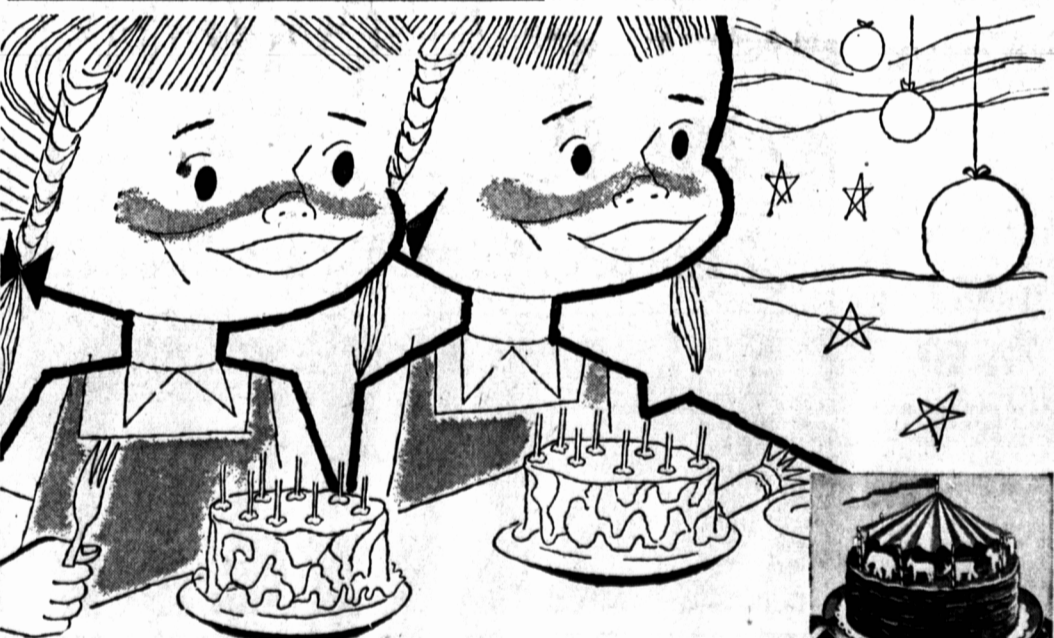
