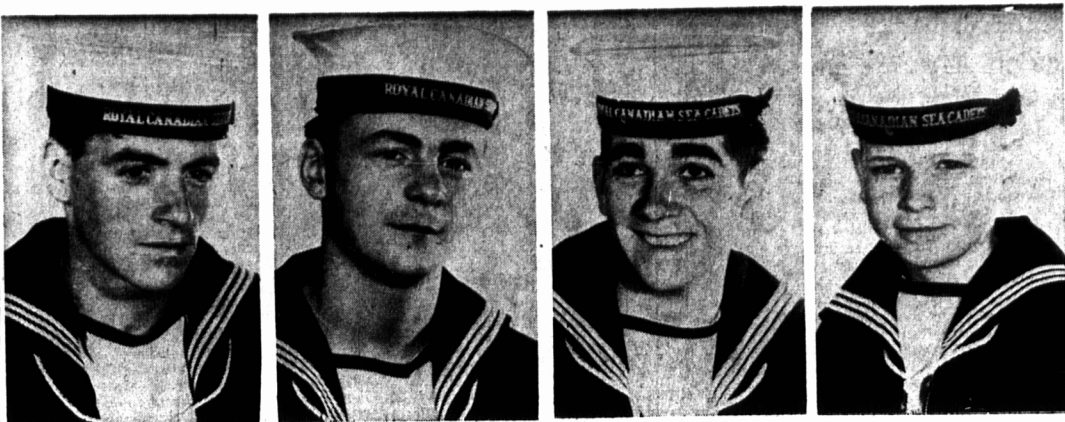

was an increase of 25 over the previous year's opening enrollment. During the year the number enrolled increased to 811. 24 boys left the school district and 17 pupils left school. It is estimated that most of these 17 could have completed one or two more years of school.

It is a great pity that these boys do not realize the handicap of a low educational standing until later years when the lack of education becomes a grave detriment to their advancement in the seeking of higher wage positions.

It is interesting to note that in 1897 only six classrooms were used in Queen Square — today there are 24 classrooms operation with 27 full time, and 3 part time teachers. In September of this year it will be necessary to open two extra classes.

Three new teachers joined our staff last September, namely: Miss Alice McCarthy, Miss Noreen McCarthy, and Miss Helen Cullen. All have given splendid service.

Attendance during the year was excellent and truancy has been lower than usual. Our attendance officer, Mr. McLeod, is doing a splendid job. His tact and co-operation go a long way to keep our attendance at a high level.

The general health of our pupils remains high and the health surveys and inoculations conducted by the Department of Health and Welfare under direction of Miss Bessie Beer have done much to keep up such a high degree of general good health.

Notable among the inoculations has been the Salk Polio Vaccine inoculations to the pupils of Grades one and two. No cases of ill-effects have been reported and the boys seem to enjoy the novelty of receiving these injections.

The Dental Survey this year shows a big improvement in Dental Hygiene and parents are urged to co-operate with the advice given on the survey cards.

The teaching of art classes this year has been under the direction of Mrs. McKay who has worked wonders with our budding artists. Her enthusiasm and evident skill have done much to stimulate interest in this phase of our school work.

I regret that our music instruction was curtailed this year. The Music Director, Mr. Brock, did not complete the year. However,
