He is Douglas V. Lapan, 36, of Toronto who yesterday stepped into the role vacated by R. G. (Gerry) Riddell, 42, who has become head of Canada's permanent delegation to the United Nations. For a varied job, Douglas Lapan has the benefits of a varied background. A graduate of the Universities of Toronto and of Oxford, he has specialized in English language and literature. He returned to Toronto to lecture in 1937 and 1938 and then went to Harvard to do the same until 1941.
