SCOTT ACT SUSTAINED By the Privy Council.

Special Dispatch to the Examiner. ST. JOHN, N. B., June 22. The Privy Council has decided in favor of Scott Act.

Government Majority INCREASED TO SEVENTY.

Special Dispatch to the Examiner. OTTAWA, June 22. Government will have over seventy majority.

Ontario fifty-one Conservatives sure and thirty-seven Liberals, four seats to be heard from; Quebec, fifty-three Conservatives and eleven Liberals, one tie; Nova Scotia, fourteen Conservatives and seven Liberals; New Brunswick, eight Conservatives and eight Liberals. Six Liberal ex-Ministers defeated. Every man of Sir John's Government re-elected. Huntingdon defeated. Sir John polled two hundred votes in Carleton. May, Conservative, six hundred and thirty-one. Bronson, Grit, six hundred.

"Lizzie Cameron" Sunk!

Special to Messrs. Welsh & Owen. ST. JOHN'S N'FD, June 22. The barque "Lizzie Cameron" struck an iceberg on the 16th inst., 45 deg. north, 48 deg. west, filled and turned over in half an hour. Crew all saved; got here last night in ship's boat.

GENERAL NEWS.

NEW YORK, June 21. The San Francisco steamship "City of Tokio" brings Hong Kong dates of 27th May and Shanghai 26th May. A serious discussion is progressing at Tsung Li Tamen upon the course to be pursued respecting the American anti-chinese action. One party is said to welcome it as affording opportunity for severing all relations with the United States majority. All agree in declaring that Chinese rights have been ruthlessly disregarded.

ADRIAN, Mich., June 21. Seven hundred persons have been poisoned here since Friday by eating a certain brand of cheese—none fatally. Microscopic examination shows cheese was filled with unrecognized parasites.

DESMOINES, Ia., June 21. Reports from Story County represent the damage there by the cyclone on Saturday night as serious. Several buildings were swept at Kelly. All the buildings on McFarland's and Templeton's farms were swept away; two schoolhouses in Nevada were demolished. A schoolhouse in Albany was carried away. All the growing crops in the track of the wind were destroyed. Cattle, horses, hogs and poultry were carried long distances and deposited dead. Several lives were lost and a number wounded.

Henry county's loss by the storm will reach half a million.

NEW YORK, June 21. The Herald's correspondent telegraphs from Lena Delta, April 12th.—Melville found the bodies of DeLong's party in two places, 800 and 1,000 yards from the wreck of the scow. Melville party stopped at the place Ninderman, and passed the first day after leaving DeLong, feeling sure the others had not got much further. There they found the wreck, and following along the bank, came across a rifle barrel hung upon four sticks. Two bodies were found here, under eight feet of snow. Melville went along the bank and saw a camp kettle and the remains of a fire about 1,000 yards from the tent, and approaching nearly tumbled on DeLong's hand sticking out in snow. Here, under about a foot of snow, they found the bodies of DeLong, Ambler and Asham, all partially covered by pieces of tent and blankets. All the others except Alexia they found at a place where the tent was pitched. Two boards, records, medicine chest, and a flag on a staff were behind the tent. None of the dead had on boots; their feet were covered with rags, tied on. In the pockets of all were pieces of burnt skin which they had been eating. The hands of all were burned and looked as if when dying they crawled into the fire. Byrd was lying on the fire and his clothing was burned to the skin. Collins face was covered with cloth. All the bodies were carried to a hill, three hundred feet high, forty yards to the southwest from where they were found, and interred in a mausoleum constructed of wood from the scow surmounted by a cross. The mausoleum was covered with stones and will be sodded in the spring. The cross is inscribed with the record and names of the Dead. Melville and party then separated to search the Delta for Chipp's people. Ninderman and Bartlett found nothing and Melville has not yet returned. The search will be extended.

METROPOLIS, Ill., June 21. A cyclone yesterday blew down several houses, killing Dick Turner, capizing and sinking the steamer "Jennie Walker" and scattering the harvested wheat. Damage heavy.

ATLANTON, Kansas, June 21. Friday night's storm extended southward and westward of Kansas City, doing greater damage than at first supposed. Many small places visited are mourning the loss of life and property.

IOWA CITY, Ia., June 19. A dozen lives were lost during the storm at Irish Ridge. There was a tornado in the south-western part of B-one County on Saturday; the buildings of several farms were demolished. A church near Olden was destroyed and many seriously injured; one man was killed and a woman and child are missing.

NEW YORK, June 21. The Herald's London special says Parnell says, regarding Davitt's new departure,

that however theoretically sound the plan of nationalization of land may be considered by its supporters, he cannot see how it can ever come in Ireland within the region of practical politics. In using the phrase, "the land for the people," Parnell never intended to convey adhesion to nationalization, but meant that if Irish tenants were converted into occupying owners, the land would be held in such a manner as would have been of the most advantage to the whole people. It would not be easier and perhaps not as easy to obtain land from the landlords for £140,000,000 compensation under the system proposed by the Land League. The annual payment by the tenant would be larger under nationalization than under the Land League plan, as the tenant under the former would have to pay taxes in additional instalments. There is no hope whatever that this or any other Government is likely to, in our time, advance money for the nationalization scheme. Parnell intends to adhere to the original Land League programme, and believes Davitt will follow the same course when convinced of the impracticability of his scheme.

ALEXANDRIA, June 21. The programme of the new Ministry includes the maintenance of status quo and the fulfilment of international obligations.

LONDON, June 21. The police precautions for the safety of Mr. Gladstone, recently allowed to lapse, have again been renewed.

The Cabinet, to-day, settled upon the instructions for guidance of Lord Dufferin at the conference. They will be despatched to him to-night.

In committee on clause eleven of the Repeal Bill, in the Commons, last evening, Mr. Gladstone stated that the Government intended to introduce words limiting the power of police search at night to occasions where there are reasonable suspicions that a secret society is actually holding a meeting. The Irish members accepted this as a reasonable and important concession, and the clause was adopted by a vote of 259 to 45.

Quinn, late secretary of the Land League, has been released from Kilmainham jail.

DUBLIN, June 21. It is stated that an extensive seizure of arms and ammunition has been made at James Street, in a low part of the city.

BALTIMORE, June 21. The national encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic was held here to-day. Pests were present from all sections of the country. Seven thousand veterans participated in the grand parade.

WILLIAMSFIELD, Ohio, June 21. Four men were killed to-day by a boiler explosion in a saw mill.

LONDON, June 21. Walsh, arrested in connection with the seizure of arms in Clerkenwell, was charged in Court to-day with feloniously and fraudulently dealing in weapons believed to belong to the Government. He was remanded for a week. Bail was refused.

PARSON TOWN, June 21. The admission of civilians to all military barracks in Ireland is prohibited. Sentries have been doubled and night patrols quadrupled. The greatest precautions are taken against explosives being carried into the military quarters.
