**Widow Of Sam McGee Dies, 73**

BEISEKER, Alta. (CP) — Funeral services will be held Friday for the wife of Sam McGee, famous Yukon gold prospector who was immortalized in a poem by Robert Service. Mrs. Ruth W. McGee, 73, died here Monday. She was born in Liverpool, England, and moved to Ontario in 1885 before going to the Yukon six years later. It was there she married Sam McGee. Mr. McGee felt the gold lure of the north three times. His last trip was in 1917 but the work of prospecting proved too much and he moved to this city, 30 miles northeast of Calgary, where he died in 1940 at the age of 70.

**Home And School Executive Meet**

An Executive Meeting of the P.E.I. Federation of the Home and School Associations was held on Nov. 29th last. **Winter Passenger Train Services Between P. E. I. Points**

MONCTON, Dec. 11—The operation of winter passenger train service between points on Prince Edward Island has been announced here by George Sliven, general passenger agent of the Atlantic Region of Canadian National Railways. The winter service will commence on Monday, December 17, Mr. Sliven stated. Between Souris and Charlottetown, trains will leave Charlottetown daily except Sunday at 2:30 p.m. and in addition at 7:30 a.m. on Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday. In the opposite direction, departure from Souris will be at 7:30 a.m. daily except Sunday and at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday. Trains will leave Souris at 5:45 p.m. on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday for Elmira, and will leave Elmira for Souris at 6:30 a.m. on Tuesday, Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday. Daily, except Sunday, there will be trains between Charlottetown and Georgetown, leaving Charlottetown at 2:30 p.m. and Mt. Stewart Junction at 3:45. Returning, they will leave Georgetown at 7 a.m. and Mt. Stewart Junction at 9:15 a.m. A train will leave Southport at 3 p.m. for Murray Harbour, and leaves Murray Harbour at 7 a.m. daily except Sunday. This will also provide service to Lake Verde, and passengers will use a taxi service leaving Charlottetown station at 2:45 p.m. daily to connect with the train at Southport. For passengers from Murray Harbour, taxi will be provided from Southport to Market Street in Charlottetown. The cost of the taxi service is included in the rail fare.
