Confederation Protection Assured Representation Of P.E.I.

OTTAWA.—As the Commons continued debate of a bill to establish and independent commission to handle the problem of redistribution, it was made clear that Prince Edward Island's four-member representation in the house will continue to be protected by the Senator.

Hon. J. Angus MacLean, MP for Queens, obtained support from Secretary of State J. W. Pickersgill to the proposition that no change is being contemplated in this "floor" which provides that Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick will never have fewer members of parliament than they have Senators.

Local Jaycees Hear MacLean

Speaking at Thursday night's meeting of the Charlottetown Junior Chamber of Commerce, Hon. Angus MacLean, MP for Queens, described his recent trip to Europe as a member of the House of Commons defence committee.

He told as a delight of his escape from Germany, the visit to a people who had hid his escape from German-occupied territory during the Second World War. 21 years ago. He visited the couple in the same apartment building in which he hid after his plane was shot down during a raid.

"GOOD REASON" CITED

Mr. MacLean said that there is a good reason for permitting the populations of rural areas to be comparatively smaller than those of urban centres. He said that a member represents not only the people in his riding but the constituencies, themselves, and suggests that a member representing a vast empire like the Northwest Territories not only represent the comparative few people there, but also a large natural resources of the area.

Mr. MacLean also argued that people in rural ridings require more personal representation than those in urban ridings. This comes about, he suggests, because people in isolated areas frequently do not have readily available office facilities of the various departments of government to which they can go.

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Myrick's Of Alberton Ltd. Opens New Grocery Dept.

ALBERTON — Myrick's Alberton Ltd. has announced that the opening of its new grocery department will take place next week.

The firm was originally established at Alberton South more than 100 years ago under the name of Hall and Myrick. Later it was moved to Alberton and for some years has borne its present name. Since the beginning it has been a general store and has handled almost every kind of merchandise, including the requirements of farmers and fishermen.

In January, 1957, it was made known that the business had been acquired by the Purdy and Henderson Co. Ltd., Montreal, of which William Fraser, formerly of Alberton, was president.

Later that same year additional floor space in the store was provided by the construction of an 18 by 36 room at the rear of the main building. It became the department which contains men's and boys' clothing, boots and shoes. A former stock room was remodelled to become the dry goods department. This additional space at second floor level permitted expansion of hardware and grocery departments on the ground floor. Floor coverings, wall paper, etc., are on the third floor.

Another change in ownership took place two years ago when the business was acquired by the Perley and Wesley Hardy, formerly of Alberton, was president.

Within the past couple of months a 30 by 60 foot extension has been built to the south side of the old building. This gives a main floor which measures 60 by 60 feet. The new part is now the grocery department and the remainder of the main floor is a hardware and furnishings department.

Walls are in an aquamarine shade with white trim and a newly tiled floor predest an attractive appearance.

Hardware and furnishings are well displayed on shelves and islands. In the grocery department there are three gondolas, three dairy coolers, fruit and vegetable stand, and a modern meat counter. Two check-out counters are in use.

The store is staffed by a courteous and efficient staff. They are Percy Hardy, Wesley Hardy, Miss Helen Hardy, Mrs. Frank Weeks, Mrs. Elmer Hansell, Mrs. Arthur Wilkie, Miss Ann Carter, Dean Carpenter, Lloyd Rayner, Henry Wallace, Justin MacArthur, Alton Sellick and Gerald Saunders.
