**NEW MAIL ARRANGEMENT.**

As a result of the protest of the business men of the Province, represented by the Charlottetown Board of Trade, the Steam Navigation Company have adopted a new arrangement under which, for all practical purposes, we shall be as well off, or almost as well off, in respect to the mail service as during the summer season. The reason why the Northumberland came away from Point du Chene before the mail arrived there was the difficulty and hazard of getting out of Shediac harbor after night-fall. So it has been arranged that all the mails shall come on to Pictou, and that the steamer Princess shall leave there with them each midnight and arrive here sufficiently early every morning to have them despatched by the outgoing morning trains to all parts of the Province,—while the business men of the city will have their letters and papers to hand on going to their offices at 8 o'clock. Under this arrangement the people of outlying sections, including Souris and Georgetown, Alberton and Tignish, will have their mails twenty-four hours sooner than under the fall arrangement which has been discarded. This is the great advantage gained. On the other hand, there will be minor advantages and disadvantages. Passengers for Pictou, Halifax and other parts of Nova Scotia will leave here at nine o'clock instead of at seven as heretofore. This advantage is counterbalanced by the fact that passengers from Nova Scotia must necessarily cross the Straits in the night. Passengers from the West will have the option of stopping over a St. John or Moncton and crossing in the Northumberland next evening, or proceeding to Pictou and arriving here on the previous morning; while passengers for the West will leave by early train and the Northumberland and will have the same despatch as heretofore. Under the new arrangement, Captain McLean and the officers and men of the Princess will, of course, have to change their order of living until navigation closes, and the gentlemen of the Post Office and some of those on duty at our hotels will be compelled to cut their morning slumbers short. But taken altogether, the new arrangement is to be commended as affording, under the circumstances, "the greatest good for the greatest number," and removing the disgrace of allowing our mails in transit to be held up for twenty-one hours.

**A CONSERVATIVE GAIN.**

Our Liberal papers are loud in their boasts over the election of Hon J. M. Gibson, of the Ontario Government, in East Wellington. The Patriot draws therefrom the conclusion that "the Tories are a discredited party." Now what are the facts? East Wellington is and has been ever since confederation, a Liberal constituency. At the last general election in Ontario there were three candidates in East Wellington, and yet the Liberal won by a majority of 188. The present bye-election was a straight party fight between Dr. Coughlin, the Conservative candidate, and a member of the government which exerted all its influence and patronage on his behalf. The Government felt that if it lost East Wellington, its prestige would be completely gone. A great effort was, therefore, put forth to save the riding. The success of the Government under these circumstances does not, certainly, prove that the Tories in Ontario are "a discredited party." In point of fact Dr. Coughlin, despite all the disadvantages under which he contested the district, polled 311 more votes in the recent bye-election than he

did at the preceding general election. So that the result may be taken as a sure proof that the Conservatives are gaining ground. A like gain throughout Ontario would give the Conservatives an overwhelming majority in the Legislative Assembly.

**FRUIT GROWING.**

**Advice For Our Fruit Grower's Association.**

The following letter from Mr. Wolverton, secretary of the Pioneer Fruit Grower's Association of Canada, and that of Ontario, who is also editor of the Horticulturist, to Rev. Father Burke, of Alberton, will be read with interest:

Rev. A. E. Burke, Alberton.

DEAR FATHER BURKE,—I have to thank you kindly for favors received. I fully appreciate the value to your province of P. E. I. Fruit Grower's Association, and am glad to find that the government is taking an interest in the good work. I only regret that the amount of your grant is so small. You certainly ought to have \$500 per annum, at the very least, if the fruit growing interests of your country are of any importance.

I think the distribution of literature on fruit growing and the giving of lectures on horticultural subjects quite as important in the conduct of horticultural societies as the giving of premiums to professional prizewinners; and I quite hope you will not make the mistake of spending your money in the way of giving premiums or prizes for fruits at exhibitions. If you knew the frauds that are conducted by those who simply buy up collections and go about from fair to fair for the sole purpose of carrying off the prize money, you would see that it is best to entirely avoid that danger and spend the amount of your grant and the fees from your members equally in the interests of every member. This system we are now cultivating in Ontario after many years' experience with the prize business.

I shall be glad to notice the work done by your society from time to time, if you will be kind enough to forward me notes.

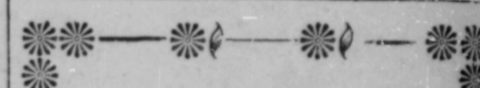
