LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

Appointment of Hon. Andrew A. Macdonald.

SIR,—It appears that my former letter respecting the fitness of the Hon. A. A. Macdonald for the Senatorship does not meet with the approval of your correspondent "Queen's County" or of the editor of the Watchman. They endeavor to lessen the force of my argument by showing that I inadvertently forgot the fact that the Hon. Mr. Haviland was one of the delegates to the Quebec Conference, and that he still resides on this Island. Mr. Haviland's name did not occur to me at the time. For some years past he has not been considered as a sympathizer and supporter of the Liberal-Conservative Party, and consequently would not be eligible for a political favor like the Senatorship. The Watchman wants to know how Mr. Macdonald was honored at the time of the Quebec Conference. The fact that he was selected as the colleague of Messrs. Coles and Whelan on that memorable occasion shows that my assertion was perfectly correct. That he was chosen as one of the delegates at that time, when the ablest men in this Island were in public life, shows clearly the high position Mr. Macdonald held in this country, and I know of nothing he has since done that would lessen his standing.

One would imagine that Mr. Macdonald is a senile, decrepit old man if you take the utterances of "Queen's County" or the Watchman as evidence. The fact that he is younger than Sir John Macdonald was when he led his party to victory in 1878 and introduced the National Policy that has built up Canada so greatly during the past twelve years, should be an effectual reply to those who object to Mr. Macdonald's age. At 61, a man who has taken care of his health and lived a virtuous life, is only in the vigor of his manhood. And the new Senator can compare favorably in this respect with many younger men who are ready to cry out against him.

With respect to Mr. Ferguson's letter protesting against the relatives of Mr. Macdonald defending his appointment, I may inform him that nearly one half of the Macdonalds of King's County (and they are no small body) are relatives of the new Senator, who has long been recognized as the chief, not only of the Macdonalds, but of the Scottish Highlanders in this Province.

Let Mr. Ferguson take care he does not participate in the attempt to throw disparagement on the new senator, or it may tell against him at some future time when the votes of the Macdonalds of Queen's County are in demand. The clan that would not brook an insult even from their loved prince at the battle of Culloden, and would rather perish where they stood than accept an inferior position in the field, are now just as jealous of their honor; and those who try to defame the new senator may yet have as great cause to regret their action as Charles Edward had to grieve over his mistake.

Let Mr. Ferguson content himself without striving for office until time—that casts a halo over the record of all public men—will bring to him the recognition his services deserve. When that period arrives he will find that he has no better friends than the clan Macdonald and

Cardigan Notes.

Shipped per s.s. Carmens, McPhee, master, from Cardigan Bridge for St. John's, Nfld., on 21st inst., by Jas. E. Macdonald, Esq.; 26 head fat cattle, 29 fat sheep, 1,000 bush potatoes, 2,000 bush oats, 900 doz eggs. Value, \$3,600. The cattle were fed by Geo. E. Goff, Michael Costello, Andrew McAulay and John Lathard, Cardigan; Thos. Donohoe, Patrick Kelly and Alfred Gordon, Rosneath; Wm. Gordon, Brudenell; George Moar, Georgetown; Jas. Gordon, Wm. McIntyre, New Perth; John Moar and Robt. Curran, Baldwin's Road.

The registered shorthorn bull fed by Wm. Gordon, Esq., Brudenell, was a magnificent animal, weighing 2,140 lbs., and it seems a pity to see so fine a stock-getter going into the hands of the butcher.

The brig Corsican arrived on the 25th inst., and is loading for St. John's, Nfld., with cattle and horses.

Cardigan is becoming quite a port for the cattle trade.

Mr. Geo. E. Goff sold 2,005 bushels of potatoes to Mr. E. M. Ely this spring at 40 cents a bushel, all of which were grown on Woodville Farm, Lot 54. The McKinley bill does not hurt so badly after all.

Miss Goff has returned from spending the winter with her sister in Missouri. Mr. Harry N. Goff is also visiting his parents.

The stone-cutting establishment of Wm. P. Lewis & Sons at Cardigan Bridge has been in full blast all winter and this enterprising firm have on hand a grand assortment of monuments well worth seeing. The artistic manner in which flowers, vines and other natural objects are carved by the

senior member of the firm adds greatly to the value of the work. Mr. Lewis reports business very good, notwithstanding the hard times; which shows that in this Province there are many people who can afford luxuries as well as necessities.

A visit from the Supervisor is badly wanted by many of the roads in this vicinity. It looks as if we would have only bridle paths pretty soon, if people are allowed to encroach on the public highways as they are doing. The Commissioner of Public Works should give his attention to this.

Mr. Kenneth McKenzie lost his eldest daughter, aged 13 years, on the 25th inst. under extremely sad circumstances. It appears that she came home from school about a fortnight ago and went down to the river to help her brother to get some buckets of salt water for pickling fish. Taking off her shoes and stockings she waded into the cold water, and from the effect took rheumatic fever. Notwithstanding the best efforts of Dr. Allan, the poor little girl succumbed to the disease on the 25th inst.

News Notes.

Fever is said to be raging among the officers and men of the British fleet at Malta. It is reported that 40 men are sick on each vessel, and the hospitals are overcrowded.

The last of the old New Brunswick 6 per cent. bonds, assumed by the Dominion at confederation, will be due first November this year. There will then remain only about half a million British Columbia 6 per cent. bonds. The only Dominion bonds paying 5 per cent. now outstanding amount to under 2½ millions, but there is still 140 millions of 4 per cents. The saving in interest when these amounts are replaced by 3 per cents will be about a million and a half per annum, so that the outlook is very favorable.
