Report U.K. Rearmament Falling Behind Schedule

LONDON, Sept. 8.—(Reuters) — Britain's \$13,000,000,000 rearmament program is lagging seriously in several important particulars, an official report showed. Parliament's select committee on estimates expressed most concern over a shortage of skilled and unskilled labor and a lack of scientific workers. It said also that delivery of machine tools was not what it should be, that sheet steel production was too low, that a shortage of scrap steel was threatened and that deliveries of aircraft, vehicles, clothing and canvas to the armed forces were "rather behindhand."

decrease of younger people, as well as drafting young men, made the situation more difficult. Older people were being encouraged to stay on the job and women were being brought in. About 1,750 scientific workers were urgently needed in the next two or three years, the report said, but recruiting was difficult. The committee said that the great majority of scientists were working on the arms program but it would be better if many were employed instead on projects that would not come to fruition for another 10 years. The shortage of steel scrap, which the committee said would lead to a drop in steel output, was blamed on lower imports from Germany. The report said that 2,000,000 tons were brought in last year but this year's figure would be only about one-quarter of that.

U. S. Steel Report

CLEVELAND, O., Sept. 9.—(AP) — The defence program's demands for steel are being stepped up, and orders from manufacturers of consumer durable goods and the construction industry are falling off. Steel magazine says today. The next effect is that the overall demand on mills is as strong as ever, despite some soft spots attributable to government limitations on use of raw materials, the metalworking trades weekly reports. Last week, production reflected Labor Day holiday curtailments by dropping one point to 99 per cent of capacity, or 1,980,000 net tons. Pricewise, the picture was unchanged except for a \$36 a ton increase by an eastern producer in carbon plates.

U.K. Not Asking Direct U.S. Aid

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8.—(AP) — The British Chancellor of the Exchequer, Hugh Gaitskell, said today that Britain has run into serious financial difficulties from rising import costs, but is not asking at this time for new direct American aid. Gaitskell left open after a round of conferences whether Britain will ask for a waiver of some \$78,000,000 due this year on the \$3,750,000 loan the United States extended in 1946.

In a meeting with Commerce Secretary Charles Sawyer, he also made plain that his country would welcome a chance to buy more scarce steel from the U. S. for both arms and civilian production. The 42-year-old Chancellor, who arrived yesterday, had meetings also with Treasury Secretary John Snyder and with Charles E. Wilson, director of defence mobilization. Wilson was the first of a series of high-level talks the U. S. is having with Britain and French officials, leading up to next week's meeting of the Big Three foreign ministers here and a subsequent session of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization at Ottawa.

These will cover the whole range of problems faced by the West in its arms buildup against Communist pressure.
