

Canadian Navy Ships Use Icebergs For Targets In Arctic

OTTAWA (CP) — The navy has been on an iceberg shoot for four weeks. It hasn't destroyed any icebergs but it has decapitated a few.

The Ninth Canadian Escort Squadron, comprising the Frigates Leuzon, Cap de la Madeleine, La Hulotte, Swanesa and Buckingham, is on a training cruise to Hudson Bay. The Cap de la Madeleine and La Hulotte made a side trip to Fort Harrison, Que., on the east coast of Hudson Bay, to visit an Eskimo sea cadet corps.

The squadron has reported to naval headquarters that it sighted its first iceberg two days out of St. John's Nfld. Later, others came into view with increasing frequency.

The steadily procession was headed south on its annual mission of menacing western approaches to the North Atlantic shipping lanes.

Icebergs are formed when zambrook ice silvers break off the edges of glaciers along the coasts of Greenland and the Canadian Arctic Islands. Glaciers are said to have "calved" when they give birth to icebergs.

DRIFT SLOWLY

It takes two years for the bergs to reach the transatlantic shipping lanes. After they break free of the Arctic they drift into the south-flowing Labrador current with a strong easterly wind blowing against the visible portion. Eventually the bergs melt when they enter the warm gulf stream.

The International Ice Patrol, formed after an iceberg sank the Titanic in 1912, keeps tabs on iceberg movements and issues regular warnings on the location of meeting bergs.

For the navy, the icebergs are useful for target practice. On this voyage, one berg estimated at 150 feet in height above the surface, took about 12 direct hits.
