Four of the Packers hits were triples with Mike Connolly, Gene Ward, Len Azevedo and George Bradley being the hitters. Mike Connolly led all hitters with two hits in three runs and also played a good defensive game.

John MacLeod hit a triple for the City and John Houghery came up with a good all-round performance.

second consecutive four-hitter as he led the Basilio Youth Club to their win over the Dairymen. Father Roche also had four hits in four innings getting a home run, triple and two singles.

Yanks Conquer Indians In Rubber Of 3-game Series

Mickey Mantle smashed a home run into the stands in the sixth inning and left Noren robbed Hank Majeski of one in the eighth Thursday as New York Yankees conquered Cleveland Indians 3-2 in the rubber of their first three-game series at Yankee Stadium.

Meanwhile Washington Senators were trouncing Detroit Tigers 16-6 in the sixth inning of the National League. Philadelphia edged St. Louis 5-4 while Brooklyn downed Chicago 10-2.

The Yankee victory sliced a full game off Cleveland's first-place lead over New York, which now stands at 3 1/2 lengths. The Indians have 21 games left to play, the Yankees 22.

Mantle's homer ignited a three-run outburst that offset homers by Sam Dente and Larry Doby and shattered Bob Lemon's 11-game winning streak. A pair of damaging errors by Cleveland first baseman Vic Wertz, a pass to Noren and Andy Carey's clutch single furnished the two other runs.

A crowd of 39,494 saw a brilliant pitching duel between Lemon and Whitey Ford, the ace Yankee southpaw, who was working on a streak of his own, having won nine of his last 10 starts. Each pitcher allowed only three hits, but Lemon was unfortunate enough to permit two of them in the fatal sixth.

Neither Lemon nor Ford went the distance. Lemon gave way to Hal Newhouse in the eighth, but was charged with the loss, his sixth. Ford needed help from Alie Reynolds in the ninth after Larry Doby had topped his 29th home run with one out to cut the Yankees' margin 3-2.

Reynolds walked Al Rosen on four pitches to raise the Indians' hopes, but he quickly snuffed out Vic Wertz on a foul pop, and got Dave Philley to bounce into a game-ending force play.

Ford, credited with his 16th triumph against seven defeats, had shown signs of truing in the eighth. With one out, he issued his first walk to pinch-hitter Rudy Regalado. Majeski, another pinch-hitter, sent a long high drive into the lower left field stands but Noren leaned backward over the low rail-

Suspend Owner Of Derby Winner

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Andy Crevelin, owner of Kentucky Derby winner Determine, was suspended by the California Horse Racing Board Thursday for "conduct detrimental to racing."

A hearing was set for Sept. 27 on the suspension. Last week it was investigating statements by Crevelin in a magazine article that his stable does not always try to win the first, second or third time with a young horse.

Crevelin, whose remarks appeared in The Blood Horse, a breeders' magazine, later told reporters he did not say some of the things attributed to him. But when a tape recording of the Crevelin interview was played back to reporters it appeared he was quoted accurately.
