GEORGE BURNETT, who was arrested at Hunter River, for robbing the mails was examined before Theoph. DesBrisay Esq., J. P. to-day. Part of the money stolen, (\$63) was recovered at his father's house yesterday by Marshal Flynn. Burnett was remanded to jail for further examination.

WALLACE ROSS sternly protests against postponing the race at Winnipeg as desired by Hanlan for two weeks. The race must be rowed on July 3rd, according to terms, and if another race has to be decided upon it will be an after consideration. The regatta committee there telegraphed Hanlan accordingly.

SHIPWRECK AND LOSS OF LIFE.—The schooner Dier was lost off the Magdalen Islands on Thursday, and it is feared all on board have perished. The sailing brig Peerless is missing with a crew of seventy-five. The Government steamer has gone in search of her. The schooner Venture, Power, master, was lost on Wednesday, with all hands, on the voyage from Placentia Bay to St. Pierre.

MR. C. J. SPEAR, formerly travelling agent of the "All-Rail Line," is in town. He now represents the "Hathway Line," a direct line of steamers from Annapolis, N. S., to Boston. People contemplating a pleasant trip to the States, would do well to consider not only the advantages and beautiful scenery of the Annapolis Valley, but also the cheapness of the fare—a single fare being only \$7 from Halifax to Boston, and an excursion return ticket being only \$12.

CONFIRMATION.—To-day, St. Dunstan's Cathedral, was filled with people from an early hour to witness the holy rite of Confirmation. Three hundred and seventy persons were confirmed. There were sixty-two girls from St. Ann's School, one hundred and six from St. Joseph's Convent, and two hundred and one boys from the Cathedral. His Lordship Bishop McIntyre, said Mass, preached in his usual chaste and vigorous style, and performed the beautiful ceremony of confirmation. He was assisted by the Rev. A. McGillivray, P. P., the Rev. Dr. Grant, and the Rev. Father Corbett.

ARREST OF COUNTERFEITERS AT OTTAWA.—An Ottawa despatch says: Quite a sensation was caused here to-day by the arrest of two hitherto highly respected young men on the charge of counterfeiting. Several \$10 bills of Bank Nationale have been refused of late, and the detectives have at last secured sufficient proof to cause the arrest of two brothers named Sparrow, one a teacher of drawing in the Model School, and the other for some time Private Secretary to Hon. John O'Connor. The prisoners have hitherto borne an unexceptionable character and their arrest causes general surprise.

Liberal-Conservative Meeting at Crapaud.

The North Wiltshire Route Discussed.

An adjourned meeting of the Liberal Conservative Club was held at Crapaud Corner on Saturday evening the 10th inst. About fifty electors were present. Mr. B. A. Bailey, Mr. Collett, Mr. P. Trainor, Mr. B. D. Howatt, and several other gentlemen addressed the meeting in reference to the proposed Branch Railway, all setting forth strong and convincing arguments in favor of the North Wiltshire Route. All parties claim that this route is practicable level ground and a straight line. The length of this line is, I believe, only eighteen miles, making it twelve miles nearer Charlottetown from Cape Traverse than the County Line Route—opening up one of the most important farming communities on the Island. It would therefore benefit a large section of this country, Lots Twenty-seven, Twenty-eight, Twenty-nine, Thirty, Sixty-seven and Sixty-five, also also taking to market our surplus produce, which had heretofore to be stored over winter, therefore causing a serious loss to our merchants. Then let us all unite and return the Government Candidates to power, who will be in a position to carry out this great object which is attracting the attention of the electors at the present time.

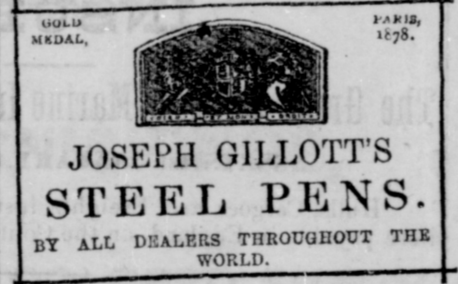
