

Dutchmen Hard Pressed In Beating Czechs 6-3

CORTINA d'AMPEZZO, Italy, (CP)—Canada's top-ranked Kitchener-Waterloo Dutchmen had to come from behind twice to defeat Czechoslovakia 6-3 in their Olympic hockey game Monday night.

In their toughest game of the tournament to date, the Dutchmen trailed 1-0 for more than five minutes in the first period and dropped behind again 2-1 early in the second before three successive goals enabled them to take command.

The unbeaten Canadians joined Russia and the United States at the head of the standings after one day of play in the six-team, round-robin final series. The U.S. squad, Canada's opponents today, subdued Germany 7-2 while the Russians defeated Sweden 4-1 in games played earlier in the day.

A pair of goals by Paul Knox in the second period sent the Canadians into the lead to stay after the Czechs, striving to maintain their undefeated record, had kept them hustling to remain on even terms in the game's early stages. Jim Logan also scored twice for the winners, whose other goals came from Jerry Theberge and Don Roper.

CHEER DUTCHMEN

A small, but vocal section of Canadian rosters among the crowd of 5,000 fans was loud in its encouragement of the Dutchmen. The group, which included more than 20 Kitchener district residents, rang bells, waved Canadian flags and chanted "C-A-N-A-D-A."

Zdenek Navrat, a newcomer to international competition this season, was the chief source of Canadian discomfort in the early going as the Czechs outskated the Dutchmen and thwarted their combination play.

Navrat sniped his first Olympic goal in the first period and banged home another in the second, giving the Czechs the lead each time. Vaclav Panteucek's late second-period goal kept it close at 4-3 until the Canadians pulled away with their two third-period scores.

The Czechs looked smart going both ways throughout the game. They showed a smooth passing attack and covered up well in front of their goal. By contrast, the Dutchmen played in spurts and the losers couldn't hold them when they were at their best.

Undercurrent Of Resentment Arises Against Russians

(AP)—An undercurrent of resentment against the Russians throughout much of the conversation in this Alpine village where the winter Olympics are being held.

You didn't have to walk half an icy block Monday night to hear a conversation along these lines: "I am only a few days away from intensive training, can't you understand that?"

"I wonder how much longer such one-sided shows as the Olympics will go on?"

"Many believe it won't be many years before something gives way. This group holds that either the Russians will kill the Olympics or other countries will forget the old definitions of amateurism and give their athletes all the training facilities and aid they need."

Others were less competitive — meaning — about counts and that the present situation will continue.

The seventh winter Games are almost half finished. With 10 of the 24 events completed, the Russians — taking part for the first time — already have 85 points, far more than any other team.

While their brothers were away grabbing headlines in N.B. the basketball crew took on Mount Allison in their first intercollegiate outing of the year and hung a 57-49 lacing on them. This basketball victory was the realm of the unexpected but the win was no fluke. S.D.U. was simply a better team on the night's play and deserved their win.

It looks like it is going to be a big year for the Saints. The hockey squad is currently racing on top of the intercollegiate heap with three straight victories, and two of those were on the road. On Saturday night they will be playing St. Thomas at the Sports Arena and a victory then will come close to sewing up the N.B.-P.E.I. title for the Saints.

However their win over UNB may have been a costly one for their outstanding left winger Buck Davey came up with a pulled shoulder muscle. The changes, which will affect all leagues from minor groups all the way up to the professionals, now will be submitted to the CRU and if approved in March for formal approval. It is unlikely the CRU executive will turn them down.

The committee also eliminated double penalties of yardage and down, increased to two the number of linemen who can block in yards in front of the line of scrimmage and made changes in the penalty for a third down incomplete pass in the end zone.

Two "privileged" backfielders will be allowed to block 10 yards outside the end zone. They must be outside the end man on each end of the line when the ball is snapped.

The committee in wiping out the double penalties provides for the non-offending team to have an option of yardage or down as down. On third — down — incomplete passes in the end zone the defending team will take possession at the point of the last scrimmage instead of at its own 25-yard line. On a third-down intercepted pass in the end zone the intercepting team will put the ball in play on its own 25-yard line or from the point of last scrimmage if it is outside the 25-yard stripe.

Touchdown Now Counts Six Instead Of Five In Canada

TORONTO (CP)—A touchdown will count six points instead of five in Canadian football starting this season.

The Canadian Rugby Union rules committee took this historic action at a meeting here Saturday ending the era stretching back to the 1870s in which the value of the touchdown has always been five points. The value of the touchdown now will be the same in the U.S. and Canada.

The rise in prominence of field goal specialists during the last few years led to the suggestion from many football men for a change. They argued that two field goals shouldn't count the same as a converted touchdown since it was easier to score that way.

The switch from the traditional five-point touchdown was accompanied by a new ruling pushing the scrimmage line on a converted attempt back to the 10-yard line from the five.

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Reds Draw Farther Away In Unofficial Team Standings

CORTINA d'AMPEZZO, ITALY, (CP)—Russia, led by its record-breaking speed skaters, drew far ahead in the unofficial team standing at the winter Olympics Monday while Scandinavians renewed their claim to cross-country ski laurels and the American girls took a sizable lead in the figure skating.

The Soviet athletes, who have spent months in training in contrast with men and women of other nations who must work out when they can find the time, now appear likely to dominate the winter Games as no national team has ever done before.

Best performance by the Canadians Monday was sixth place in the first three compulsory figures of the women's skating, held by Carole Jane Pachl, 17-year-old Canadian champion from Montreal.

The only Canadian in the speed skating, Ralph Olin, 30-year-old Calgary policeman, covered the 1,500 metres in 2:19.7, a Canadian record, but it was good enough only for 41st place in the 62-man field.

Tremendous Offer For Nashua Is Turned Down
