TOTAL WRECK.—The schr. William B., from Glace Bay for Halifax, went ashore at Port Caledonia, and is a total wreck. She is insured at \$3,000 in a Halifax Office.

MAILS.—The St. Lawrence left Summerside this morning for Point du Chene and will return this evening. It will probably be the last trip, as ice is accumulating to a great extent in Summerside harbor.

THE FALL OF TABLE ROCK.—A few weeks ago, with a tremendous crash, the centre rock in the Canadian fall at Niagara gave way and tumbled into the abyss below, thus completely changing the appearance of the cataract. Instead of a horseshoe it is a right angle.

THE RECENT FORGERY.—The name of W. D. Harrington, of Halifax, says the Chronicle, is also a forgery by Hubley. He (Hubley) did business in Halifax for some time as a grocer, but failed and was in Harrington's service for a short time.

KEROSENE.—The policemen were yesterday engaged in taking an account of the quantity of kerosene on the premises of our storekeepers. Those having more than 60 gallons will be dealt with as the law directs, unless it is immediately removed.

SUDDEN DEATHS.—Mrs Daniel Chisholm, of Piedmont Valley, Pictou county, died suddenly on Tuesday last—probably of heart disease. She was only 26 years of age.—On the same day, near River John, on the Tatamagouche road, a daughter of Mr. William Langille, 18 years of age, fell down dead while engaged in house work.

THE market of to-day was somewhat larger and more active than usual. The prices were as follows:—Butter (fresh) from 24 to 26 cents; (tub) from 19 to 21 cents; geese (each) 45 to 55 cents; ducks, from 24 to 30 cents; fowls (each, from 18 to 20 cts; eggs (doz.) from 20 to 24 cents; potatoes, from 28 to 32 cents; oats, from 36 to 40 cents; hay, ton, \$16 to \$20; pork, from 5 to 6 cents.

A LARGE number of the Moncton people went over to Shediac on Sunday to make inquiries and, if possible, aid in the search for the missing Timothy McCarthy. Nothing new was developed. On Saturday a hat was found in the Scadow river, and identified as the hat worn by the missing man McCarthy, on his departure from Moncton.

RETURNED NOVA SCOTIAN.—Capt. Rolf, of Kempf, returned a few weeks since from California, rather disgusted with the country. He has been out there a year, and returning, going in the boat from San Francisco to Sacramento, was robbed of his money, amounting to \$300. His through ticket to New York and some small change was all he had left. The Captain says the Pacific Coast is swarming with black-legs, and Nova Scotians have far better chances of accumulating a fortune at home.—Wind-see-Mail.

THOMAS ISMAN was, yesterday evening, arrested for being the leader in the robbery of Mr. Crabbe's till. He was examined before the Magistrate this morning, and said he would stand trial in the Supreme Court. Mrs. Crabbe deposed that she was attracted to the shop by the noise of the bell that is attached to the till, and on entering, saw Isman lying across the counter with a box containing some silver in his hand. He escaped from the store pursued by Wm. Crabbe, but not caught. He was remanded seven days in company with Millar.

The brig, *Flectwood*, owned by Messrs. Longworth & Co., commanded by Capt. Edward English, is now loading and bound for a port in the United Kingdom. This is the third cargo of this year's produce that this vessel has taken from the Island in a very short time. This season she has made a voyage to Newfoundland and back, then to Bermuda and back, and is now ready to proceed on her voyage. This, we consider, is extraordinary quick work for a sailing ship. We wish Capt. English and his vessel continued success.

PLEVNA CAPTURED!

A GLORIOUS STRUGGLE!

OSMAN PASHA SERIOUSLY WOUNDED AND A PRISONER.

[By Telegraph to Reading Room and Daily Examiner.]

LONDON, Dec. 11.  
The Egyptian contingent will be increased by 12,000 infantry, and 1,000 cavalry, and four batteries of artillery.

Reuter's Telegraph Company has the following despatch, dated Bucharest, 9.40 p. m.: "Plevna is now in the hands of the Russian and Roumanian armies." The Russian Agency announces that "Osman Pasha attempted to break through to Widdin, but being attacked in the front and rear, was compelled to lay down his arms after a glorious struggle. Osman Pasha himself is seriously wounded. The "S. S. City of Berlin" arrived all well. Her shaft is broken.

LONDON, Dec. 10.  
Suleiman Pasha passed through Rasgrad on Friday, on his way to Rustchuk.

NEW YORK, Dec. 11.

LONDON, Dec. 8.  
The "Saturday Review" has a strong article on the exclusion of England from peace negotiations, and says Germany is, for some mysterious reasons, more Russian than Russia herself, and it is true that Austria has hitherto followed the lead of Germany. The exclusion of England from the Council will depend not on the choice of the Russian Government but on the possible inability or unwillingness of England to interfere.

LONDON, Dec. 10.  
The rumor that the Servian troops crossed into Turkey is unfounded.

Operations against Erzeroum have been postponed a fortnight.

A Russian division is marching towards Trebezond. It will probably cut off communication with Erzeroum.

The Czar returns to St. Petersburg about Christmas.

The Russian official loss between Nov. 10 and 17 is 3,153; total loss since the beginning 74,858 men.

The inhabitants of Scutari and Nebani demand help against Montenegrins or they will solicit aid from Italy.

PARIS, Dec. 8.  
Balbie forms a new French Ministry. He lays stress on the loyalty and good intentions of MacMahon and asks assistance from his colleagues to form a new Ministry.

A majority of Constitutionalists favor another dissolution.

Some desire the impeachment of the President for high treason.

Public Opinion at the East.  
To the Editor of the Daily Examiner:

DEAR SIR,—It is becoming more and more evident every day that the present Local Government of this Island is doomed. Like the new Governor of Manitoba, its members are "rank and smell to heaven." The people are thoroughly aroused. If the Davies-Stewart combination possessed the least respect for the feelings of betrayed electors it would resign immediately. Although but one indignation meeting has yet been held in the First Electoral District of King's County, it must not be inferred that the electors of this District are not in sympathy with the general feeling of deep indignation against the Government, which prevails in other parts of the country. Protestants and Catholics are unanimous in condemning the School, Ballot and Road Acts of last Session. We were told that under the new Road Act farmers would have great cause for rejoicing. What are the facts? Never before were the roads more neglected than this fall. The two brothers Stewart—cousins of His Honor from Georgetown, along with Lord Townshend—who do the supervising of the highways for this District, have not come up to the standard of even the old order of things. Look, for instance, at the state of the road near Souris Bridge. Every high tide, this road, for the distance of over 100 yards, is covered with water to the depth of two or three feet. Pedestrians are compelled to either wait or wade. If this road is to remain in its present neglected state, we would suggest that a canoe be provided, and "all same one brudder" be appointed to ferry travellers who may be so unfortunate as to have to pass that way when the tide is in.

The dissatisfaction in this part of the Island in regard to the Assessment Act is deep and wide-spread. Even the hungry officials themselves are either afraid or ashamed to speak a word in favor of their masters. Every official is looked upon with mingled feelings of contempt and distrust. Instances of the unfairness of these Appraisers are numerous. The owner of certain mills, against whom one of the Appraisers entertains a most unreasonable and satanic apite, is compelled to pay seven times as much tax as other millers who might be named who are in better circumstances. Scores of people have been similarly used whose names will be forthcoming if this statement is questioned. Eternal shame on the Government that countenances the wholesale robbery of persons, whose circumstances are sufficiently hard to bear without being burdened with ruinous and unjust taxes, levied by bankrupts and sycophants of the most obnoxious type.
