## Eight Fishermen Appear In Court

ALBERTON — Eight lobster fishermen, mostly from the Tignish area, appeared before Magistrate W. Chester B. MacDonnell yesterday for possession of undereated lobsters. For possession of 371 undereated lobsters Charles Frederick Gaudet, Tignish, was fined \$75 and costs or 30 days in jail. Joseph George Doucette, Tignish, was fined \$80 and costs or 30 days for possession of 280 undereated lobsters and John Joseph Piro, Tignish, was fined \$50 and costs or 30 days for possession of 328 illegal catches. Piro was commended by the magistrate for being the first to readily admit that he planned to sell the short lobsters. Fishery Officer Thane Douglas asked for a severe penalty in view of the fact that the lobstermen involved were in separate crates and not in the regular legal catches. Edgar Gaudet, Tignish, was fined \$15 and costs for possession of 63 undereated lobsters and Louis James O'Rourke, Killdare Central, was fined \$60 and costs for possession of 111 short lobsters. Following sentence the magistrate issued a stern warning that future offenses would call for a jail term in lieu of a fine. Carl Ellsworth, Palmer Road, pleaded not guilty to possession of 60 undereated lobsters. Following the hearing the evidence of Fishery Officer Edward Tremblay the case was adjourned for a week. Melvin Joseph Chalmers, Harper Road, pleaded guilty to possession of 345 undereated lobsters and the case was adjourned to July 4. While Edward

## Ingo Feels Tax Bite At Home

GOTEBORG, Sweden (AP) — Former heavyweight champion Ingemar Johansson, who had tax troubles in the United States, is finding the tax man tough at home, too. Boxing promoter Edwin Ahlqvist told the newspaper Gotesborg — Posten Wednesday that tax claims resulting from the June 17 fight when Johansson recovered the European heavyweight title by knocking out Dick Richardson of Wales were "senseless." He said the city wanted \$70,000 in entertainment taxes, in addition to rent on the stadium. At the same time, tax authorities have decided Johansson should declare an income of \$100,000 for 1961 in the year he lost his third title fight to Floyd Patterson. Taxes on that amount would be \$80,000 Ahlqvist said. The promoter said he was investigating Vienna, Austria, as the location for the next Johansson fight, sometime in the fall. He named no opponents, but the newspaper says a Archie Moore, Zora Foley or Bob Cleroux of Montreal were possibilities.
