LONDON, Aug. 9.—The House of Lords has confirmed the permission given to Lord Salisbury to sell his ancestral seat, Savernake, to Lord Inver, formerly Mr. Guinness, the brewer. With the three-quarters of a million thus obtained, Lord Salisbury's creditors hope he will settle some of his debts.

SIMLA, Aug. 9.—The revolt of the Hazara tribes in Afghanistan becomes more serious daily. General Sir Frederick Roberts, with a large detachment of troops, has been dispatched by the Indian Government to meet the Ameer at Jellalabad.

TORONTO, Aug. 9.—Sir Daniel Wilson was buried to-day amid many signs of mourning. There was a brief service at his house, at conclusion of which Rev. Dr. Sweeney conducted a funeral service at St. Phillip's Church, where Sir Daniel worshipped. The interment took place at St. James' cemetery. Sir Oliver Mowat, Vice Chancellor Mulock, Thos. Hodgins, Dr. John Hoskin, and officers Hutton and Wright acted as pall bearers. The Globe is booming Principal Grant as the late president's successor, and Professor Loudin's name is also well received.
