

Two Personal Marks Set At Driving Park Yesterday

Mystery Mite, a four-year-old bay mare by Adios Senator, owned and driven by Ralph MacFadyen, Hunter River and O'Brien's Nightmare-owned by Sid Stead and driven by Harold Stead were the only double dash winners on a ten dash harness racing program at the Charlottetown Driving Park last night.

The MacFadyen driven mare paced the fastest time of the night, a 2:11.3 clocking in race nine after winning race four in the time of 2:12.4.

Harold Stead moved O'Brien's Nightmare to the top both times as the mare cut out both her miles in winning dash five in 2:13 and the repeat in dash ten in 2:12.1.

Randall MacDonald drove Kenna K to a new lifetime mark in winning the night's opener in 2:13.1. The time was a full two seconds off the four-year-old mare's previous mark Highland Rogue driven by Joe Hennessy and second and Chief Operator driven by Don MacNeill was third.

Leith Carr, subbing for driver Clark Smith, pulled an upset in race six as he teamed the roan gelding Josedale Co Pilot to win in the time of 2:14. Carr gave the gelding an excellent drive as he came from the four hole at the three-quarter pole to

race the fast closing Kenna K to the wire.

Impel, a five-year-old bay gelding by Torpid, owned by Reagh Sudsbury and driven by Don MacNeill, took the second dash in the time of 2:14 but the gelding was drawn in the repeat in race seven, won by the Ralph MacFadyen driven Downtown colt Mystery Romeo. The colt's mile was 2:17.1.

Randall MacDonald hung a new lifetime mark on the trotter Bell's Last as he teamed the gelding to a win in race three in the time of 2:14. The time clipped 12.5 seconds off the gelding's previous best mile.

Cyclone Kelly driven by Lorne Kelly took the repeat in race eight in the time of 2:14.

HUNTERS' CORNER

In 64 Years Ducks Have Almost Disappeared

I am in a reminiscent mood tonight and have checked back on old hunting records and diaries. I shot my first black duck sixty-four years ago at the age of eleven years. I still have the gun in my possession, a 10 gauge German double barreled with a name that's almost unpronounceable. In 1901 I picked potatoes at 30 cents per bushel and trapped mink and muskrat to make the money. If my memory serves me correctly the price was \$9.00 and that was money in those days. Incidentally the gun was second hand and not new.

By any stretch of the imagination, I shot my first duck at Lake Verde. I was too young and inexperienced to compete with the old time hunters at the Old Home Lake. It could be that I have shot my last black duck. I did not shoot any last season, although I had several good opportunities, and it's a cinch I'll not shoot any this hunting season.

Early Sunday morning September 11th my partner and I left on a check of the old black duck haunts. Our first stop was at the Old Home Lake. The trail across the barrens was well marked by foot prints some of which were made within a few days. We naturally thought that they were made by hunters on a "blind" building expedition but later had cause to change our minds. It's blue watered, lily pad dappled surface was as devoid of feathered life as the Sahara Desert. Where there should have been hundreds of themselves there was nothing but flat emptiness. A lone black duck drake, flying three gunshots high, came from the east. We could see his neck turning to check its surface but when he spotted us standing at lake edge he kicked off and left the scene at top speed. He wasn't in range of even a super load of chilled shot. BB's at that.

Our next stop was Gil Jardine's Little Pond. It got its name from the farmer, long since deceased, who owned the barren on which the Pond lies. It is in the barrens an approximate mile from Wisener's Dam. The former home of 12 black ducks. It's an immense dam with its upper reaches filled with a heavy stand of wild rice. The black ducks frequenting Wisener's use this spot as a resting and sunning have been disturbed by trout fishermen at this spot.

ed by trout fishermen at this spot. About three weeks ago a lone black duck had roosted for a short period on its sunny, mossy bank. A year or so ago it's flat, mossy border would have been littered with feathers and other sign of black duck "roosting" and preening. I remarked to my partner: "There are no black ducks at Wisener's."

Just to make sure I called Col. F.B. Conrad on the phone after our return to Charlottetown. When asked about the duck situation at Wisener's he replied: "Not a single black duck there this year." He did however, furnish me with a bit of enlightening information. He told me that early this spring he was trout fishing at the spot known as "The Rice Hole" well up toward the head of this huge body of water. Suddenly he was surprised to see a tiny, midge-sized black duckling not much larger than the egg from which it had emerged slowly swimming toward the boat. A moment later it was joined by another just like the first. Both appeared reluctant to leave the boat edge and when the time came to pull out he had great difficulty in getting underway without hurting the poor little orphans.

One evening in early spring I was out at my property at Mount Albion checking on the duck situation on a specific dam. Wisener's Dam would be an approximate mile, or slightly better, directly east. As the dusk of evening began to settle I heard two heavy gunshots in quick succession and, as soon as a hunter could quickly slip another cartridge into the breech came a third shot. I told my partner later that someone had taken a crack at the ducks at Wisener's. The poacher may not know it but he would have killed a whole brood for the sake of taking a mother duck that, in all probability, would be as palatable as dried chips. Yes, he could have killed eight or ten potential black ducks for the sake of shooting one. Come to think of it... is it any wonder that our ducks, both blacks and teal, are on the verge of the Never, Never Land so far as this province is concerned. According to reliable information our sister Maritime Provinces are close to being in the same boat. If they are not already in it!

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Bob Bailey's grand-slam home run and a solo homer by Roberto Clemente gave Pittsburgh Pirates a 6-1 victory in 11 innings over San Francisco Giants Monday.

The second-place Pirates' third straight victory moved them to within one game of the National League-leading Los Angeles Dodgers, who played Philadelphia in a night game.

Clemente led off the 11th with his 26th homer off Giant reliever Frank Linzy and the Pirates then loaded the bases on a double by Willie Stargell, a single by Donn Clempendon and an intentional pass to Bill Mazeroski.

Bob Bolin went the first eight innings for the Giants and gave up two hits, but the Giants made four errors behind him and he

Rangers, Wings, Hawks Join Leafs And Bruins

Members of New York Rangers, Boston Bruins and Chicago Black Hawks congregated in their home cities Monday for the start of their 1966 National Hockey League training camps.

All three teams did little more than check in and register during the day.

Toronto Maple Leafs opened their camp at Peterborough Thursday, while Boston Bruins began pre-season workouts Saturday at London, Ont. League and Stanley Cup champion Montreal Canadiens begin their training camp at Montreal Forum Friday.

Meanwhile, the Leafs already have begun serious scrimmaging with a line comprised of veteran Red Kelly, Ron Ellis and rookie Brent Imlach showing up as the top offensive unit.

RETURNS TO SCHOOL
Ellis is beginning his third year with the Leafs, and Imlach, a son of Toronto coach Punch Imlach, played last season with Toronto Marlboros of the Ontario Hockey Association Junior A series. He left the camp to return to school Monday.

Imlach, who hasn't revealed what players he has already signed for this season's campaign, got quick reaction from team captain George Armstrong Sunday. The 15-year Toronto veteran signed after a 15-minute conference with assistant coach King Clancy.

He did not disclose the terms of the contract but said he was satisfied.

"I think I'll be able to help the club," Armstrong said.

"Things have looked pretty good so far in training camp and we'll have a good hockey team this year."

THREE COME IN LATE
Marcel Pronovost, Larry Jeffrey and Norm Armstrong were the last three players to report to the Leafs camp. All three had been granted special permission to miss the first few days.

In the Bruins camp, there was talk from general manager Hap Emms that rookie Bobby Orr, 18, might be converted to a forward.

Orr took his turn on defence, but "we might even try Orr on the forward line for a couple of shifts," Emms said.

Orr, who played as a defenceman with Oshawa Generals of the OHA Junior A for the last three years, set a series goal-scoring record for defencemen during a 1964-65 and bettered it last season.

He signed his professional contract with the Bruins a few weeks ago. It was described as one of the best contracts ever given a rookie.

Rookie coach Harry Sinden, who coached Oklahoma Blazers of the Central Professional League last season, began immediately to assess his 18 hold-overs and 21 rookies.

Robinson May Be 1st. Since Mantle

NEW YORK (AP) — There are still a couple of points to be settled in the American League's three important betting categories and Baltimore's Frank Robinson is making a point of being in the thick of both.

Only one thin point separates Robinson from Minnesota's Tony Oliva, the batting leader.

The Baltimore slugger is one ahead of teammate Boog Powell in the runs batted in competition, but holds a healthy lead in homers.

Should Robinson finish ahead of Oliva in batting and Powell in RBI he will be the first major league player to win a triple crown since Mickey Vernon of the New York Yankees' slugger did it in 1956 with a .353 average, 52 homers and 130 RBI.

Hank Aaron of the Braves is the NL leader in homers with 39 and RBI, 116.

No one else is close. Al Kaline of Detroit is third at 289 followed by Leon Wagner of Cleveland and the Orioles' Powell, 288 each. The figures include Sunday's games.

Robinson shacked two homers and drove in four runs last week, giving him 45 homers and 107 RBI. Harmon Killebrew of Minnesota is the runner-up in home runs with 36 while Powell is second in runs batted in with 106.

Matty Alou of Pittsburgh continued to hold a commanding lead in the National League batting race although he fell four points to 346.

Felipe Alou of Atlanta, Matty's brother, and Rico Carty, also of the Braves, are deadlocked for second at 330. Tied for third at 321 are Roberto Clemente, the defending titleholder, and Willie Stargell, both of Pittsburgh.
