From the above it will be seen that out of the 19 employees at the Hospital, 13 are Protestants and 6 Roman Catholics. The salaries paid to Protestant employees amounts to \$1,228.00 annually, and \$1,344.00 to Roman Catholics. This is exclusive of the Medical Superintendent.

Fitness should be the sole consideration in making appointments in this and every branch of the public service. When this rule is fairly applied, all denominations will receive justice, the proportion of suitable applicants being equal among all creeds. We are sure Dr. Blanchard never asked a man or woman seeking employment to what denomination he or she belonged. The facts which we have given above does not show by any means that a preference has been given to Roman Catholics.

The conduct of the Opposition in circulating this report is in keeping with its course in other matters. When the independent taxpayers of the country demand the abolition of the Legislative Council, the fears of some weak-minded men are worked upon by an underhand canvass, and the story of Roman Catholic ascendancy is whispered in their ears. When members of the Government are unable from the press of other public duties, to attend a public school examination, a cry of danger to the Free School system is immediately raised. Once more we deprecate these mean tactics. They should be discountenanced by every right-thinking man.

Ornamental Trees.

The late Hon. George Beer some years ago planted a number of ornamental trees, on the street extending from the St. Peter's Road to his property near King Square; and that street is now, perhaps, the handsomest in this city. In this Mr. Beer was a benefactor of Charlottetown. Will not some of the old gentlemen now living benefit the city in the same way? If everyone were to plant the right kind of trees in front of his property, and protect them a few years from the ravages of boys, we should in a few years have a pretty town, and it would be so much the more pleasant to live in.

British Federation.

WHAT JUSTIN MCCARTHY THINKS OF IT.

A New York Herald correspondent undertook recently to ascertain the views of certain persons in and out of the British Parliament, including a couple of the Irish Land League advocates on the British Federation question. We give extracts from a few of these for just what they are worth. From Justin McCarthy the historian, he obtained a letter favoring consolidation, of which the following is an extract:—

I would have a truly imperial Parliament to disengage not parochial or local or even national affairs, but business that is common to all nationalities and States bound up in one confederation. According to my idea England proper, Ireland Scotland, Wales and various colonies should all be represented there, each at the same time having its separate domestic Parliament to manage its own business. Such an idea is growing every day in the colonies. It is much favored and consequently discussed at the Royal Colonial Institute here, an organization founded for the express purpose of representing colonial opinions. The colonies say with unanswerable force that at present they are exposed to all the dangers which a war between England and any foreign Power may bring without having any will whatever in England's foreign policy. I do not lay much stress upon the proportion of representation to population, although that will doubtless come in the end, but for the present it would matter little if the old conditions of county and city representation prevailed. In these countries the great object is to establish the principle of a federation, with national or local Parliaments for local or national affairs, and an imperial Parliament for the business of the Empire. Such I believe to be the ultimate solution of the problem of government in every system where different races, creeds, traditions and habits have to be taken into account and reconciled.

French Foreign Policy.

The French Minister of Foreign Affairs, recently, sent a circular to the French representatives abroad, setting forth the policy of France on the Montenegro, Greek, and Tunisian questions. It says French foreign policy is constantly inspired by a desire to maintain peace. As nobody in the world can doubt France would take up arms if compelled by honor or self-defence, her Government has no difficulty in declaring that it wishes to settle amicably all international questions. The circular repeats the assurance that the Tunisian expedition was only undertaken to chastise marauders, and says France in fulfilling the duty imposed by her moral and material superiority will assist in regulating the Tunisian administrations, and extend her impartial protection to the enterprises of all nations.

Arctic Exploration.

A letter from Hammerfest published in the Berliner Tagblatt says that on May 24th the snow was yet from six to ten feet in the streets. During last winter the weather was unusually severe throughout all the northern regions. The captain of the yacht Hirdfiskeen reports that in the passage to Spitzbergen, at a distance of over one hundred and seventy miles from the Norwegian coast, he met such a quantity of ice that after vainly endeavoring to go around it by taking a westerly course, he had to give up his voyage and return to Tromsø. The captain declares that the ice was steering steadily towards the Russian and Siberian coasts, and he concludes it was not new ice of last winter, but old pack ice.
